

53RD REGULAR SESSION – MAY 22, 2007

Mayor R. E. Bruchey, II called this 53rd Session of the Mayor and City Council to order at 7:02 p.m., Tuesday, May 22, 2007, in the Council Chamber at City Hall. Present with the Mayor were Councilmembers M. E. Brubaker, K. S. Cromer, L. C. Metzner, P. M. Nigh and A. Parson-McBean; City Administrator Bruce Zimmerman, City Attorney William Nairn and D. K. Spickler, City Clerk.

The invocation was offered by Councilmember Penny M. Nigh. The Pledge of Allegiance was then recited.

Mayor Bruchey announced the Rules of Procedure for this meeting will be followed as adopted March 28, 2006. It was announced that the use of cell phones and electronic devices during meetings is restricted and that all correspondence for distribution to elected officials should be provided to the City Clerk and should include a copy for the City Clerk for inclusion in the official record.

The next scheduled meetings are: Work Sessions beginning at 4:00 p.m. on Tuesday, June 5, 2007, Tuesday, June 12, 2007, and the Regular Session on Tuesday, June 19, 2007.

CITIZEN COMMENTS

Robert Rauth, AF & AM Friendship Lodge, 54 S. Potomac Street, Hagerstown, Maryland, thanked the Mayor and City Council and Rodney Tissue, City Engineer, on behalf of the Masonic Temple for allowing the opportunity for a new entrance to the lodge from the new parking deck.

Todd Groesbeck, 1159 Outer Circle, Hagerstown, Maryland, expressed opposition to the Downtown Live festival. He asked that more family oriented events be planned and events that will build the community.

Mary Haines, 27 Laurel Street, Hagerstown, Maryland, stated she would like to see a vicious and dangerous animal ordinance passed. There is a serious problem with people who don't clean up after their dogs. She provided information for how to clean up easily with plastic bags.

Charles Stewart, 2 Public Square, Hagerstown, Maryland, expressed his opposition to the Downtown Live festival. He is concerned the event will be limited to beer and hard rock music. He is concerned the burden on downtown will be significant. He submitted a correspondence to be part of the record of the meeting.

Valerie Minter, 2 South Potomac Street, Hagerstown, Maryland, expressed her opposition to the Downtown Live festival. She stated the festival last year was to be similar to Frederick's In The Street festival. It was nothing like that festival. The businesses were not surveyed by staff as discussed at the May 8, 2007 meeting. Mayor Bruchey stated there was not a consensus of the Council to have staff talk to the business owners. Councilmember Nigh stated she understood the businesses would be contacted. Councilmember Cromer and Councilmember Parson-McBean stated they did not feel there had been a consensus at the May 8, 2007 meeting.

Shateema Thomas and Leoncia Stephens, 441 N. Potomac Street, Hagerstown, Maryland, stated they do not feel there are many job opportunities in Hagerstown. They have felt inferior and feel as though they've been treated unfairly because they are black. They have had issues with their utility bill and felt like staff was not listening to them. They thanked Councilmember Parson-McBean for listening to them.

Patrice Gundy, 436 Park Place, Hagerstown, Maryland, stated her experience in Hagerstown has been good; however, there is turmoil in her neighborhood. She is concerned that there is drug trafficking occurring overnight. Two vehicles parked at her house have been hit. She stated the Downtown Live festival caused turmoil all day last year. She suggested doing something different for the community.

Carlen Loy, Piedmont Gifts, 109 S. Potomac Street, Hagerstown, Maryland, stated she is opposed to the Downtown Live Festival and it does not provide a benefit to downtown. She depends on traffic for her business and if the street is closed, the traffic ends.

Gordon Bartels, 139 S. Mulberry Street, Hagerstown, Maryland, asked dog owners to use the receptacles at locations in the parks for disposing of waste. He then talked about the budget process. He thinks there should be more time between the budget hearing and adoption of the budget. He recommended instituting a policy that anything brought forward at the hearing must be discussed at the next work session. He is concerned about the amount included in the CIP budget for widening the sidewalks on S. Potomac Street. He expressed opposition to the Downtown Live festival.

Janet Bartels, 139 S. Mulberry Street, Hagerstown, Maryland, is concerned about the Community Development program for the City. This program is important for communities. She is interested in making Hagerstown a more livable city. She suggested celebrating the 20th year of the National Pike Festival next year. The wagon train travels through Hagerstown and this would be a good idea for a festival.

Myron Martin, 13235 Maugansville Road, Hagerstown, Maryland, asked the City to please open Terps Boulevard. Having this road opened will not provide a financial gain for his business. He is concerned that people purchasing lots on this road are being deceived about the anticipated traffic.

Mike Davis, 7 E. Washington Street, # 805, Hagerstown, Maryland, stated there are 80 people in his apartment building that are opposed to the Downtown Live festival.

Brian Sullivan, Maryland Theater Executive Director, stated the theater received \$ 5,000 from the Downtown Live festival last year. He supports the event and it is important to bring people to downtown and show them what Hagerstown has to offer.

Doug Reed, 12013 Wolfsville Road, Smithsburg, Maryland, was representing HAYSL (Hagerstown Area Youth Soccer League). He thanked the City for allowing HAYSL to use the fields at Fairgrounds Park. They have tried to assist in watering the field. It would require a large number of hours to adequately water the field. They were glad to hear the City is going to irrigate the fields. Mr. Reed stated scholarships are offered for children who would not otherwise be able to participate in the league.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

A. Approval of an Ordinance: Budget FY 2007/2008

Action: Councilmember L. C. Metzner made a motion to approve an ordinance as introduced on May 15, 2007 and subsequently revised to adopt the budget for fiscal year July 1, 2007 through June 30, 2008 in the total amount of \$ 157,032,860 and to amend that any hiring of safety personnel in FY 07/08 would have to be by vote of the Council and the acceptance of the Council to approve the expenditure of the funding to hire the additional 11 safety personnel (9 firefighters and 2 police officers). The 11 public service personnel are funded but not authorized to be hired until voted on by the Council. Councilmember A. Parson-McBean seconded the motion.

Discussion: Councilmember Metzner stated this body would have to approve the hiring and associated expenditures of the additional 11 safety personnel with the amendment to the motion. By approving the motion for the budget and the associated amendment, the funding will be appropriated (but not spent) and the tax rate will be set. He stated he understands from Mayor Bruchey that he will not veto the ordinance, if the amendment includes that further discussions will be held prior to hiring any safety personnel. Councilmember Metzner stated Councilmember Brubaker presented a funding plan proposal for discussion. Councilmember Metzner will support the hiring of nine firefighters this year because it is long overdue. He wants firefighters and police officers to understand the funding is in place for the additional

safety personnel if the budget is approved, but the Council will have to discuss it further.

Councilmember Cromer stated she will not vote for the budget and it has nothing to do with the hiring of additional firefighters. She stated cuts need to be made and the Council has to prepare for next year's budget now. She stated with the amendment presented by Councilmember Metzner the funding will be in place and the Council would vote at a later time to hire additional firefighters. She wants to review the amount of money that is allocated to other organizations.

Councilmember Brubaker stated he presented a funding plan and is now viewed as being against public safety, which is not the case. He developed a funding proposal to add the firefighters and avoid a tax increase. His proposal also includes reducing the deficit in the second year. He will not vote in favor of the budget without discussing other funding proposals.

Councilmember Parson-McBean is glad the Jonathan Street project is included in the budget. The people in that neighborhood need to have the infrastructure upgraded.

Councilmember Nigh does not want to approve the budget but she has to because of the need for additional firefighters. She is concerned about the funding included for Eastern Boulevard, S. Potomac Street, vacant buildings and non-profit organizations.

Motion carried 3-2 with Councilmember M. E. Brubaker and Councilmember K. S. Cromer voting No.

B. Approval of an Ordinance: Tax Rates Beginning July 1, 2007

Action: Councilmember L. C. Metzner made a motion to approve, as introduced on May 15, 2007, an ordinance to establish the tax rates for the levy year July 1, 2007 through June 30, 2008 on the basis of \$0.798 per \$ 100 of the assessed value of all real property and \$1.995 per \$ 100 of the assessed value of all business personal property within the City of Hagerstown. Councilmember P. M. Nigh seconded the motion.

Motion carried 4-1 with Councilmember K. S. Cromer voting No.

C. Approval of an Ordinance: Sewer Rate Increase

Action: On a motion duly made by Councilmember L. C. Metzner and seconded by Councilmember P. M. Nigh, the Mayor and City Council unanimously agreed by voice vote to approve an ordinance as introduced on May 15,

2007 to increase sewer rates by 8.5% for in-City customers and 16% for County customers outside of the City in accordance with the approved budget for 2007/08. The increased rates shall be effective for all bills rendered on or after October 1, 2007.

D. Approval of an Ordinance: Adopting a Tee Marker Advertising Program at Hagerstown Greens at Hamilton Run

Action: On a motion duly made by Councilmember K. S. Cromer and seconded by Councilmember L. C. Metzner, the Mayor and City Council unanimously agreed by voice vote to approve an ordinance as introduced on April 24, 2007 to adopt a Tee Marker Advertising Program at Hagerstown Greens at Hamilton Run which has the fee schedule of \$ 750 for tee number one and \$ 500 for tee two through nine with a renewal fee of \$ 100 and authorizes staff to negotiate and sell the tee advertising.

NEW BUSINESS

A. Introduction of an Ordinance: To Prohibit Certain Vicious and Dangerous Animals Within the Corporate Limits of the City of Hagerstown

Action: Councilmember P. M. Nigh made a motion to introduce an ordinance to amend Chapter 87, Dogs and Other Animals, by adding a new Subsection 35. This amendment will require the owners of animals, which have been designated as dangerous, pursuant to the current Washington County Animal Control Ordinance, to remove the designated animal from the City of Hagerstown. This amendment does not alter the definition of dangerous animals as set forth in the current Washington County Animal Control Ordinance, nor implement any breed specific definition of dangerous animals. This ordinance also does not apply to animals declared vicious and dangerous prior to the effective date of this amendment. As noted in Section 3, the Code Amendment will become effective on September 24, 2007. Councilmember A. Parson-McBean seconded the motion.

Discussion: Councilmember Nigh stated there have been several instances in which dogs have bitten people and other dogs within the City limits. Something needs to be done to protect the citizens. Councilmember Cromer stated she is concerned that citizens will not be aware of their right to appeal such a designation.

Motion carried, 4-1 with Councilmember K. S. Cromer voting No.

B. Introduction of an Ordinance: City of Hagerstown Water Quality Bonds

Action: On a motion duly made by Councilmember L. C. Metzner and seconded by Councilmember K. S. Cromer, the Mayor and City Council unanimously agreed by voice vote to introduce an ordinance authorizing the City of Hagerstown to issue and sell upon its full faith and credit, general obligation bonds to the Maryland Water Quality Financing Administration in one or more series in an aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$6,500,000. Proceeds from the sale of the bonds will be used for the public purpose of financing Phase I of replacing the City's West End Water Reservoir with an above ground storage tank as more fully described in the ordinance together with related expenses and costs of issuance. Staff is hereby also directed to proceed with developing the necessary detailed resolutions and other documents to proceed with the sale of the bonds as directed by this ordinance. The detailed resolution will be presented to this body for approval at a future date prior to the issuance of the bonds as specified in the ordinance.

C. Introduction of an Ordinance: Refuse Collection and License Agreement for Cortland Villa Condominiums, Inc.

Action: On a motion duly made by Councilmember L. C. Metzner and seconded by Councilmember A. Parson-McBean, the Mayor and City Council unanimously agreed by voice vote to introduce an ordinance authorizing the Refuse Collection and License Agreement for Cortland Villa Condominiums, Inc. This action will allow the City's trash/recycling collection contractor to enter the private roads in this development and collect trash and recycling provided the residents pay the normal "collection fee" (that all City residents pay) and the owner's association indemnifies the City.

C. Resolution: Statement of Intent to Use Future Bond Financing for the West End Water Tank

Action: On a motion duly made by Councilmember K. S. Cromer and seconded by Councilmember P. M. Nigh, the Mayor and City Council unanimously agreed by voice vote to approve a resolution to formally adopt a statement of intent to use future bond financing for the West End Tank Project.

D. Resolution: Authorizing an Agreement for Fuel Cost Reimbursement with Community Rescue Service, Inc.

Action: On a motion duly made by Councilmember P. M. Nigh and seconded by Councilmember L. C. Metzner, the Mayor and Council unanimously agreed by voice vote to approve a resolution to authorize the execution and delivery of an agreement between the City of Hagerstown and the Community Rescue Service for the reimbursement of diesel fuel and

gasoline obtained from the city facility located at 51 West Memorial Boulevard.

E. Resolution: Revising Parking System Rates and Fees

Action: On a motion duly made by Councilmember L. C. Metzner and seconded by Councilmember K. S. Cromer, the Mayor and City Council unanimously agreed by voice vote to approve a resolution revising the schedule of parking system rates and fees, effective July 1, 2007.

F. Resolution: Approval of a Memorandum of Understanding with TourGlides, LLC

Action: Councilmember L. C. Metzner made a motion to approve the Memorandum of Understanding by and between the City of Hagerstown and TourGlides, LLC to utilize electric personal mobility devices to conduct guided tours through City Park between April 1, 2007 and October 31, 2007. Councilmember L. C. Metzner seconded the motion.

Motion carried, 4-1 with Councilmember P. M. Nigh voting No.

H. Approval of an Agreement: Maintenance Agreement with Cortland Villas Condominium, Inc. for Street Light Fixtures

Action: On a motion duly made by Councilmember K. S. Cromer and seconded by Councilmember L. C. Metzner, the Mayor and City Council unanimously agreed to approve a maintenance agreement between the City of Hagerstown and Cortland Villas Condominium, Inc. The provisions of the agreement specify that the City will agree to pay the monthly electric charges for the sixteen existing ornamental street lights and eight future street lights. Also, the Hagerstown Light Department agrees to perform maintenance and repairs of all conduit, conductor, poles and fixtures on the street light system.

I. Approval of an Agreement: Engineering Services with the Black and Veatch Corporation Engineering Services

Action: On a motion duly made by Councilmember L. C. Metzner and seconded by Councilmember K. S. Cromer, the Mayor and City Council unanimously agreed by voice vote to approve an agreement for engineering services between the City of Hagerstown and Black and Veatch Corporation. The services to be provided include design and construction assistance for the Enhanced Nitrogen Removal Improvements at the Wastewater Treatment Plant on Frederick Street.

Maryland Department of the Environment Chesapeake Bay Grant Funds will be used to pay for the \$ 1,312,000.00 Engineering Services Contract.

J. Award of Contract for Reconstruction of Marshall Street

Action: On a motion duly made by Councilmember L. C. Metzner and seconded by Councilmember K. S. Cromer, the Mayor and City Council unanimously agreed by voice vote to award the City's portion of (the Washington County) contract MS-PMP-114-28 to C. W. Hetzer of Hagerstown, Maryland in the amount of \$ 292,025.00. This project will reconstruct Marshall Street's paving from 200 feet west of Rhode Island Avenue to the City limits. The Mayor and City Council further authorized an additional \$ 20,000.00 for ditch trimming, clearing to widen the pavement and road-side grading by the Department of Public works or the contractor.

K. Approval of Application Permit for Downtown Live Festival – October 20, 2007

Action: Councilmember L. C. Metzner made a motion to authorize the closure of first block of South Potomac Street, North Potomac Street, West Washington Street and East Washington Street on October 20, 2007 for a musical festival operated by Demcore Entertainment LLC. The Mayor and City Council authorize an application/permit agreement with Demcore Entertainment LLC. Also, according to the City of Hagerstown's Open Containers Law, the Mayor and City Council may permit the possession of alcoholic beverages in open containers on the streets, lanes, alleys, sidewalks, parking lots or public ways of the City during special events upon application or upon its own initiative. Therefore, Mayor and City Council formally approve the possession of alcoholic beverages (beer and wine in designated festival area on October 20, 2007 for the musical festival only. Councilmember M. E. Brubaker seconded the motion.

Councilmember P. M. Nigh made a motion to table the motion.
Councilmember A. Parson-McBean seconded the motion to table.

Discussion: Councilmember Cromer stated the Council needs to have more discussion with Demcore, LLC about the festival. She stated Downtown Live is not the Pub Crawl. These two events are not the same. Councilmember Metzner stated the motion to table is appropriate. Many citizens spoke during this meeting. To demonize Mike Deming as he develops in downtown is unfair. Developers are encouraged to invest in downtown and then they are viewed as the "bad guys". Mr. Deming should have another opportunity to discuss the festival with the Mayor and City Council. Councilmember Cromer stated Mr. Deming is giving to the community through donations to non-profit groups. Councilmember

Parson-McBean stated it is commendable to donate a portion of the profits to non-profit groups. She is concerned that last year's festival did not include participation from all the business, as it was stated it would. She doesn't condone holding a festival just to drink on the street. Mr. Deming can help the City redevelop downtown and make it a place where people want to come. Councilmember Brubaker stated to say this is an automatic decision is not true. Mr. Deming is investing in the community, which may in turn cause others to invest in the community. Councilmember Cromer asked that this topic be added to the work session at the next meeting. Councilmember Nigh asked that input from the fire and police departments be included in the discussion. She is concerned that the street will be closed to all traffic, including emergency vehicles. Mayor Bruchey stated that three members of the Council have asked for input from the fire and police departments.

Motion to table until June 5, 2007 carried unanimously.

L. Approval of Art in the Park Fundraiser Event for The Contemporary School of the Arts and Gallery

Action: Councilmember L. C. Metzner made a motion to approve the request from Ron Lytle of the Contemporary School of the Arts & Gallery Inc. to hold a special event in City Park on Saturday, June 16, 2007 and Sunday, June 17, 2007 which includes vendors selling their wares. The City of Hagerstown will also underwrite the city services for the event of \$ 1,015.00 which will come from the contingency fund. The Contemporary School of the Arts & Gallery will meet all requirements for the event including but not limited to insurance and permit. Councilmember M. E. Brubaker seconded the motion.

Discussion: Councilmember Nigh expressed her concern that other groups will be asking the City for similar services. Councilmember Cromer stated she does not support underwriting City services. This money will be taken from the contingency fund, which is intended to be used in case of emergencies.

Motion carried 4-1 with Councilmember K. S. Cromer voting No.

M. Authorization to Submit a Grant Application to Maryland Department of Business and Economic Development (DBED) – Barbara Ingram School for the Arts

Action: On a motion duly made by Councilmember K. S. Cromer and seconded by Councilmember L. C. Metzner, the Mayor and City Council unanimously agreed by voice vote to authorize staff to submit a grant application to the Maryland Department of Business and Economic Development for

\$ 150,000 for costs associated with construction of the Barbara Ingram School for the Arts. Any required matching funds will be provided by the Washington County School System through their fund raising efforts.

N. Approval of License Agreement: Artery Homes (Sweeney Drive Sales Trailer)

Action: Councilmember L. C. Metzner made a motion to execute a License Agreement between the City of Hagerstown and Artery Homes for the installation of a sales trailer in the right-of-way of Sweeney Drive as part of the Poplar Square residential development. Councilmember M. E. Brubaker seconded the motion.

Discussion: Councilmember Metzner stated the agreement requires that the trailer be installed with approved plans and located on the alternate site discussed at a previous work session. Councilmember Cromer stated this is an open ended agreement and asked how long the trailer will be in place. Rodney Tissue, City Engineer, stated if the agreement is for nine months, unless notice the City exercises their right to end the agreement, with a 90 day notice.

Motion carried 3-2 with Councilmember K. S. Cromer and Councilmember P. M. Nigh voting No.

CITY ADMINISTRATOR'S COMMENTS

Bruce Zimmerman, City Administrator, thanked the Mayor and City Council for their hard work during this meeting. Due to the Memorial Day holiday, trash collection will be moved back one day.

MAYOR AND COUNCIL COMMENTS

Councilmember M. E. Brubaker would like to hear why some Councilmembers voted against the tax rate ordinance. He presented a proposal for budget cuts that would need to be made to be carried over to future years. He asked that the proposal be reviewed and discussed.

Councilmember A. Parson-McBean thanked the citizens who spoke during the meeting. She is concerned about the treatment one citizen says she received in Hagerstown. She will be visiting Park Place this evening based on one citizen's comments. She urged parents to be aware of where their children are. There are a number of pedophiles in the community.

Councilmember L. C. Metzner stated the City is finally getting some kind of animal control with the ordinance that was introduced at this meeting. He appreciates everyone's position on the budget. He stated there was a real possibility that the budget

would not be passed at this meeting. Compromises were made, with the biggest being made by Mayor Bruchey for agreeing not to veto the budget if the amendment was approved.

Councilmember K. S. Cromer thanked the citizens for speaking. She asked that a discussion of a dog park be scheduled for a work session. It was the general consensus to schedule this. This discussion could also include the possibility of a pooper scooper ordinance and a leash law. She asked that a letter be sent to the State's Attorney's office asking them to hear cases first in which police officers or firefighters are involved. This will reduce overtime costs.

Councilmember P. M Nigh stated forensic patients are at the Potomac Center. Neighbors to the center are being notified of this. She attended the first meeting of the Beautification Committee. She asked Code Compliance to look at a dilapidated porch on a house near her home. A shorter compliance time is needed for weed removal. The Alms House is very historic. There were 40 confederate soldiers who died at the Alms house. It should be turned into a museum.

Mayor R. E. Bruchey, II stated a balanced budget, including funding for increases in public safety, was adopted. He expects there to be budget cuts with State funding. He stated the young ladies who spoke about their treatment in Hagerstown had meetings with City staff. He defended Bruce Zimmerman, Mike Spiker and Nelia Tidler who met with them. Staff went above and beyond to find a solution to assist these ladies. He stated he downsized his vision for South Potomac Street, along with decreasing the funding included in the budget. There is still a feasible plan for South Potomac Street. He appreciates Mr. Martin's tenacity. He stated the trucks from Mr. Martin's business could have been traveling through Maugansville for some time. The trucks pass several schools by using the Marshall Street route. He talked to downtown business owners earlier today about the Downtown Live festival. He pointed out that democracy does work. It is not fair to blame Mike Deming for the problems with the Pub Crawl and to link those problems with Downtown Live. The Pub Crawl was not a Demcore LLC event. Other establishments were included. A definite plan to make the festival work is needed, or it won't happen. He will focus on what everyone can live with and make it a great event.

Councilmember Parson-McBean stated the City needs to look at how they work with their customers.
