**ENGINEERING DIVISION**

1. **Wesel Boulevard Signal.** We worked out an agreement with the County to coordinate the 8 traffic signals on Wesel Blvd & Massey Blvd from Lowes rear entrance to Virginia Avenue. We are doing the counts at three intersections inside the City to save costs. Sabra,Wang will be doing preliminary study to offer options of how to best accomplish the coordination.
2. **South Prospect Street Wall.** We are finalizing the design of the wall replacement in the northeast end of the dry bridge. This wall is failing from old age and from an automobile accident.

## PARKS & RECREATION DIVISION

**2. REPORTS**

- **04/22/16:** Officer Daveler was dispatched to Linganore Avenue for a report of a burglary. The victim stated that someone had broken into his residence and stole some jewelry and coins from a coin collection. The surrounding neighbors did not see or hear anything unusual. The victim had reason to suspect an acquaintance of his was responsible for the theft. This case has been forwarded to the Criminal Investigation Division.
- **04/24/16:** Officer Goggin responded to Baltimore Street for a reported assault. The victim was sitting on the sidewalk holding her baby when a citizen offered to call the police for her. The officer could clearly see markings and injuries on the victim and called for Community Rescue Service. The victim stated that she and her boyfriend were in a verbal argument that turned physical. The boyfriend assaulted her several times in the face and then threatened her with a knife. The officer then learned there was an active warrant for the boyfriend. He was located and transported to Central Booking and charged with Assault 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> Degree and other related charges.
- **04/25/16:** Officer Morris was flagged down by a citizen stating that someone had broken into the Eagles Club on North Locust Street. The trustee of the club responded to the scene to check to see the extent of the damage and to see if anything had been removed from the building. Nothing appeared to have been removed from the club, just damage to the door of the boiler room. Estimated cost to repair the door and frame is \$800. No suspect at this time.
- **04/26/16:** Officer St.Clair responded to East North Avenue in reference to a stolen bicycle. The victim stated he parked his bike on a friend's porch. About an hour later he went to retrieve the bike and it was missing from the porch. The bicycle is valued at \$200. A short while later the victim saw a juvenile pushing a bike that looked like his. The officer searched the area but was unable to locate the juvenile or the bicycle. No further information.

3. OTHER NEWS/INFORMATION

- **CONGRATULATIONS TO OFFICER LANGLEY DEAN AND HIS K9 PARTNER HERA:**

Officer Dean and Hera were called to help locate a female who was experiencing a medical emergency. Units searched her residence and were unable to locate her or her vehicle. A search led officers to a location not close to the female's residence. Units located her vehicle off the sidewalk and up on the curb with the driver's door open. Officers located her cell phone and purse.

Officer Dean and K9 Hera started the track out of the driver's side vehicle. Officer Dean and Hera tracked the missing woman to a small dark walkway between two houses. She was found lying on a concrete walkway between the houses, breathing but unresponsive. An ambulance was called and transported the woman for treatment. Without the help of K9 Hera the outcome could have been fatal for the female involved.

K9 Hera is a 1 ½ year old Hanoverian Hound who joined the police force in July of 2015. Prior to taking the streets, Officer Dean and Hera participated in a two week training session in Edisto Island, SC. Officer Dean has been with the Hagerstown City Police Department for 10 years.

### Water Production at R C Willson

- Staff continues to work with Hazen and Sawyer on the Tank Mixing and Traveling Screen Replacement Project.
- Operations: Operations were routine this week - staff worked on facility maintenance and routine preventative maintenance. Staff also assisted with draining and cleaning the south pre-sedimentation basin.
- Maintenance: Maintenance staff worked on routine preventive maintenance and continues to provide assistance with plant operations, as needed.
- Instrumentation: Staff replaced the turbidimeter #5, cleaned the high service pump VFD's at the Willson Plant.

### Water Production at Breichner/Edgemont Reservoir

- The Edgemont Reservoir is currently 34 feet below full pool elevation. The 24" sluice gate remains open (45 turns) per guidance provided by MDE and Engineering staff. Site evaluation is on-going to track and document seepage. Staff continues to work with MDE to refine the day to day operations of the Reservoir. City staff submitted a preliminary project schedule to MDE for review and possible inclusion into the proposed Consent Agreement.

### Water Distribution

- Distribution crews are working throughout the water system performing customer service work as needed. Crews are installing new meters and testing large meters throughout our service area. Work is going well with the water main replacement project on Antietam Street. Additionally, crews repaired a leak on South Mont Valla and assisted the Light Department on West Franklin Street.

### Laboratory

- Collected Distribution System samples for monitoring for nitrification.
- Re-checked multiple sites to verify total chlorine/monochloramine residual.
- Investigated two customer complaints regarding taste and odor. Both were normal.
- Investigated a complaint regarding color of the water. The results were normal.
- Collected annual SOC samples.


