Violet Drive – Neighborhood After-the-Fire Visit: The Hagerstown Fire Department went door-to-door Monday, March 27th in the neighborhood of a recent fire to educate residents on the importance of having working smoke alarms in their homes. The firefighters of Battalion shift "A" visited 139 homes. The visits were a huge success as the fire department was invited into 59 homes; checking 159 smoke alarms! Two smoke alarms were replaced and 12 batteries were installed as a result of the visits. The Hagerstown Fire Department reminds residents to check the batteries in their smoke alarms monthly.

PARKS & ENGINEERING

PARKS DIVISION

1. **In-Line Skating Rink.** We continue to assist with the refurbishing of the in-line skating rink at Fairgrounds Park. The fiberglass dasher boards will be completed this week.



2. **2017 Spring/Summer Parks & Rec Guide.** We had 16,000 printed guides delivered to our offices and 11,000 are being distributed into the schools. Another 5,000 guides will be distributed to various business and programs partners in the community. You can view our new guide online here: <http://en.calameo.com/read/005125358edfb97c8b7f4>

3. **Hager House.** Staff are preparing for season opening on April 7th, as well as German Easter Tours and the Annual Egg Hunt on April 9th. Flyer is attached.
4. **Golf Course.** Officially open for the season! Hours of operation through March 31st are 9 a.m. – 5 p.m. Beginning April 1st, hours are 6:30 a.m. – Dusk. Seasonal staff is hired, trained, and ready to go!
5. **Fit Room.** We are installing the new exterior Fit Room sign. The upcoming schedule is attached.

ENGINEERING DIVISION

1. **City Park Lake Dredging:** As of March 30th, we have removed around 13,000 cubic yards. That leaves just less than 5,000 cubic yards left to dig so we are over 70% done. The contractor has been digging about 2,500 to 3,000 CY per week so we will likely finish digging the week of April 17th.
2. **Stormwater Grants.** Stormwater Grant Applications: Staff applied for two grants to help fund stormwater management projects that will help the City to meet the requirements of its NPDES permit. One application requested funds from the Green Streets, Green Jobs, Green Towns grant program to install landscaped stormwater filters at two intersections on Belview Avenue. The other grant request was for funds to help relocate and restore a segment of Hamilton Run that passes through the Greens at Hamilton Run golf course. Staff anticipates that we will receive word on whether either grant application was successful in May.
3. **Safe Routes to School.** Held the pre-construction meeting for Safe Routes to School. The contractor expects to start work on June 5th at Salem/Indiana and then proceed to Frederick/Mill. All work should be completed before school opens on September 5th.
4. **Signal Upgrade.** Received design proposals for signal upgrade at Mulberry and Antietam. Low bid was Sabra Wang at \$8,000

REPORTS:

03/23/17: At 2:32 p.m., Officer Campbell responded to the HPD Lobby for a reported Strong Arm Robbery. The male victim reported at approximately 4 a.m. after leaving for work from his residence, his vehicle was stopped at the Salem Avenue/Terps Boulevard intersection. While stopped, three males dressed in all black clothing and wearing black masks approached his vehicle. The suspects did not display weapons; however the victim believed they were armed. The suspects instructed him to empty his pockets. The victim handed them \$12,100 U. S. currency, a 14k gold necklace with angel pendant, and a Michael Kors wrist watch. The victim had recently cashed his 401k check and was proceeding to Frederick, Maryland to pay an owed debt. No suspect description details were able to be furnished by the victim.

03/24/17: Officer Dean was dispatched to the 1100 block of Fairview Road for a Theft of a Fed Ex package. The reporting person had received a delivery notification which stated the package was placed on the front porch. The package was not located. The missing package contained RedHead Brand Size 11 camo hunting boots.

03/25/17: Officer Goggin responded to the 100 block of Ross Street for an Assault in Progress involving a baseball bat. The victim was found to be bleeding with a broken left forearm and injured left torso. The male victim described the suspect as a black male with a thin build, approximately 5'9"-5'10" in height, short dreadlocks and wearing a striped hoodie. The victim stated that the suspect knocked on his front door and accused him of threatening his son earlier in the day. The victim noticed the suspect had a bat behind him when speaking with his son however he did not threaten him with it. The victim stated that without provocation, the suspect swung the bat and struck him in the torso. The suspect swung a second time and hit him in the arm. The suspect then fled the scene on foot. The identities of the suspect and his son are unknown at this time.

03/26/17: Officer Bauknecht was dispatched to the 100 block of North Mulberry Street for a Forced Entry Burglary. The property landlord reported that on March 15th she had evicted one tenant from the building. At that time other individuals whom the tenant had allowed to reside with her were notified that they were no longer permitted in the residence. On March 26th, the landlord was notified by another apartment tenant that there were unauthorized individuals in the evicted, and now vacant, apartment. Upon checking the apartment, another responding officer found a black male lying on the floor inside. The back door was found that even if locked it could be forced open. The male was arrested and charged.

03/27/17: Officer Bobetich responded to Best Buy, 18053 Garland Groh Boulevard for a Theft in Progress. The Best Buy Loss Prevention Representative had the uncooperative theft suspect detained. The store representative indicated that previously the suspect had removed unpaid merchandise from the store. Therefore, he was actively monitoring the suspect with the store's surveillance. The store representative observed the male suspect place numerous Playstation 4 video game controllers in a backpack, walk past all points of sale, and then exit the store without purchasing the concealed merchandise. The detained suspect was arrested and charged for this current incident. The responding officer was provided with the video surveillance of the previous incident and charges for this incident were also filed.

03/28/17: Officer Salahov was dispatched to the 100 block of South Edgewood Drive for a Theft from Motor Vehicle. The vehicle's registered owner advised that someone had removed the catalytic converter from her red 2001 Chevrolet Cavalier bearing MD registration 9AR5919. The repair to her vehicle will cost \$970. No suspect information known. The reporting officer checked the Regional Automated Property Identification Database for metal scrap reports, however no reports were found.

03/29/17: Officer Cline responded to the 500 block of Park Lane for a reported Strong Arm Robbery. The juvenile male victim notified that while walking home from North Hagerstown High School, he noticed three males following him at a distance. The victim became nervous and began running down an alley. The suspects overtook the victim and proceeded to assault him by punching and shoving. They then removed his sneakers from his feet, removed a second pair of sneakers from his book bag and took his Spring Samsung LG Stylo 2 cell phone valued at \$150. Total value of the stolen sneakers is \$550. The victim provided a description of the suspects – height range 5'7" to 6'; one wearing dark boots and another wearing Timberland boots; all wearing hoodies; no known distinct features; dark skin viewed around eyes and masks. The victim's mother supplied that her son is known for his expensive shoes and in the past has traded his sneakers.

OTHER NEWS/INFORMATION:

Congratulations to Detective Fleegal: Detective Anthony Fleegal has been selected as Officer of the Month for February 2017. Detective Fleegal has been employed by the City of Hagerstown for 16 years and is currently assigned to the Investigative Services Division.

Detective Fleegal serves as the Department's liaison with the Washington County Child Advocacy Center and is tasked with investigating the more serious child abuse and juvenile sexual assault cases referred to the police department. Since 2014, the Hagerstown Police Department has investigated an average of over 100 cases per year which were referred from the Child Advocacy Center; the majority of which are handled by Detective Fleegal. Through his determined, investigative efforts in bringing suspects to justice, Detective Fleegal is able to give voice to innocent victims who are too young to defend themselves.

Due to his hard work and effort in bringing to justice those offenders who prey on children, Detective Fleegal has been selected as the Hagerstown Police Department Officer of the Month for February 2017. The Hagerstown Police Department is proud to have dedicated officers such as Detective Fleegal as one of its own and congratulates him for a job well done.

CHART NO. 2 – A&E PARKING DECK WEEKLY OCCUPANCY





CHART NO. 3 – UD PARKING DECK WEEKLY OCCUPANCY

Water Production at Breichner/Edgemont Reservoir. The Edgemont Reservoir pool elevation is currently at 2.57 feet (dry level). Site evaluation continues per the contract with Hazen and Triad. The project preliminary report has been received by Hazen and Sawyer and was presented to the Mayor and City Council on March 21, 2017. Hazen will complete the final report in May 2017 and once approved by Maryland Department of the Environment, design for the needed repairs will begin.

Water Distribution. Distribution crews are working throughout the system performing customer service work and new meter installations as needed. The leak survey program is still in progress. Repairs were made to a water main leak at the intersection of Buzzard Knob Lane and Greensburg Road as well as on Lexington Avenue, Greenberry Circle and Rock Willow Avenue. Work continues on the main replacement project on East Antietam Street.


