Explosive Devices Found – Sunnyside Drive: The Hagerstown Fire Marshals responded to an address on Sunnyside Drive after a person discovered suspicious items in the door of a vehicle he had acquired earlier in the day of August 1, 2017. The items were inspected and deemed potentially dangerous. The Maryland State Fire Marshal Bomb Squad was then called to destroy the items. Based on the evidence collected from the vehicle, the items were determined to be improvised explosive devices (IED's).

A search was conducted at the residence where the vehicle was obtained to ensure there were no additional devices; none were found.

In a joint operation with multiple agencies, Robert M. Schulz has been charged with manufacturing a destructive device and possession of an explosive device with intent.

Hagerstown Fire Marshal's K-9 Calvin, an explosive detection dog, along with his handler Deputy Fire Marshal G. Dale Fishack were used in various locations to search for explosive materials and were instrumental in locating evidence in the investigation.

PARKS & ENGINEERING

ENGINEERING DIVISION

1. **Safe Routes To School Frederick at Mill.** Due to existing AT&T underground lines, we had to move the signal pole and ped pole plus alter the layout of APS pushbuttons and ramps on NW corner. Contractor has started construction of sidewalk ramps at this intersection. We expect that the sidewalks will all be completed before schools re-open although there will be some signal work during school due to the late delivery of the signal poles.
2. **Annual Pavement Preservation Program.** Crack-sealing has started. Miscellaneous patching will begin next week. We are preparing pavement marking drawings for each street being treated.
3. **Pavement Markings.** Long lines and stop bars are being re-applied around the City as part of this annual maintenance program.
4. **Development.** Two planned developments on Garland Groh Blvd will affect traffic flow and we are reviewing the effects and how mitigate. We have reviewed more traffic studies this year than the last 12 years combined.
5. **170 West Washington Street.** Completed the one-year warranty inspection and found places where paint is peeling. We have notified the contractor of this and waiting for reply.

CHART NO. 2 – A&E PARKING DECK WEEKLY OCCUPANCY





CHART NO. 3 – UD PARKING DECK WEEKLY OCCUPANCY

City staff and Hazen and Sawyer continue to work with MDE Dam Safety on the final Dam Evaluation Report, Emergency Action Plans, and the design criteria and project schedule. The project continues to be on schedule.

Water Distribution. Distribution crews are working throughout the system performing customer service work and new meter installations as needed. New services were installed in the Westfields Community. Repairs were made to water main breaks on Summit Avenue and Rowland Avenue. Crews also completed a service line leak repair on Guilford Avenue.
