PARKS & ENGINEERING

ENGINEERING DIVISION

1. **Marsh Run Wall Repairs.** We discovered another serious and potential wall failure that will require a rebuild of the wall adjacent Memorial Boulevard. Starting September 25th, West Memorial Boulevard will be closed between Maryland Avenue and Guilford Avenue to rebuild the wall.
2. **Pavement Preservation.** Crack filling and patches are substantially complete. Next week milling and paving will commence on Summit Avenue (paid for in full by Columbia Gas) and slurry paving will also start on selected streets.
3. **Alley Reconstruction.** Due to work scheduled next year by the gas company, we removed one alley from the current contract. Columbia Gas will replace this alley at their cost and we are adding several shorter alleys to the current contract.
4. **Street Trees.** Botanica has resumed planting trees and are expected to finish in a few weeks. The warm weather recently has caused their nursery to postpone digging some of the Oaks until the temperatures are cooler.
5. **View to Wesel.** Bettina is making good progress on the mural and should wrap up her work this week. The Department will provide before/after shots upon completion.

PARKS DIVISION

1. **2017 Fall/Winter Parks & Rec Guide.** Approximately 17,000 copies of our annual Fall/Winter Parks & Rec Guide are currently being distributed to elementary and middle schools, local business and partners across the community. Some features of the new guide include Fit Room rentals, new indoor classes, National Road Park, upcoming events and the 2018 Hub City 100 Miler. Mayor & Council will receive their copies at the October 3rd Work Session.
2. **Golf Course.** Three sponsors have been secured for the 5th Annual Par Fore Pink Tournament scheduled for Friday, October 6, 2017. Those sponsors include The Broad Axe (Title Sponsor), Chic-Fil-A (Food Sponsor) and Bob Rocks (Radio Sponsor). Partial proceeds benefit Breast Cancer Awareness of Cumberland Valley. Registration is now open on-line! We are continuing to monitor play and revenue. Both seem to be trending downward despite the course being in excellent condition.
3. **Railroad Pavilion.** We began constructing a pavilion at the Hagerstown Railroad Museum for birthday parties and gatherings.
4. **Basketball Courts Overlaid.** We overlaid the basketball courts at Hellane Park and Wheaton Park. Restriping and rim height adjustments will occur later this month.
5. **Fit Room.** Classes scheduled through September are attached.

REPORTS

09/14/17: Officer Lucas responded to Forest Drive for a report of a burglary. The victim advised that someone had entered his side entry to his garage and took his Taotao dirt bike. The door was not secured at the time of the theft. The owner stated there was approximately \$50 damage to his property and the bike was valued at \$100. There are no suspects.

09/15/17: Officer Clingan was dispatched to East Oak Ridge Drive for a malicious destruction of property. The secretary for Paul Crampton called to report that someone had damaged Crampton's parking lot gate located on West Antietam Street. The officer reviewed the video surveillance and was able to identify the vehicle and suspect who broke the gate to the parking lot. Apparently, the suspect manually lifted up the gate so he could drive off the lot. It will cost approximately \$200 to repair the gate. The suspect was identified and Crampton was notified that he could go to District Court and file charges on the suspect for the destruction of his property.

09/16/17: Officer Cline responded to West Church Street for a report of an intoxicated male walking in the street. The officer located the male who was arguing with the Chaplain at the Rescue Mission. The Chaplain advised that the male had been asked to leave the property since he was extremely intoxicated. The male became very angry and started yelling that he wanted to fight the officer. The suspect was served with a No Trespass Order. Due to the level of intoxication of the male, the officer transported him to Meritus Medical Center for treatment. He was treated and discharged by Meritus. The officer transported him to Central Booking and charged him with Disorderly Conduct and Disturbing the Peace.

09/18/17: Officer Brady was dispatched to South Cannon Avenue for a reported robbery. The victim stated she exited the Sheetz Store on South Cannon Avenue when someone approached her from behind and knocked her to the ground. The suspect then took her purse and fled. The officer observed abrasions on her knees and elbows but she refused medical treatment. The purse contained a smartphone, prescribed medications and miscellaneous cards and items. The suspect was described as an 18-24 year old male, light build, blonde hair with long bangs, wearing a black hooded sweatshirt and grey shorts. The incident was captured on the surveillance camera for the Sheetz Store. The officer will attempt to identify this male. The investigation is on-going.

OTHER NEWS/INFORMATION

Congratulations Officers Biden and Brady. Officer Cory Biden and Officer Joseph Brady have been selected as Officers of the Month for August 2017. Officer Biden has been employed by the City of Hagerstown for 10 years and Officer Brady has been employed for 8 months. Both are currently assigned to the Patrol Division.

In July 2017, Officer Biden and Officer Brady responded to an address in Hagerstown for a report of an armed home invasion. A description of the suspect was given via police radio and Officer Biden and Officer Brady (who were patrolling together) began to search the area for the suspect. While doing so, they observed an individual matching the suspect's description in the area where the incident occurred. Officer Biden and Officer Brady exited their patrol vehicle and were able to detain the suspect without incident. While searching the suspect, ammunition was located in his pocket. Other responding officers located a female in the area and learned that the suspect handed the female a handgun just prior to being contacted by Officer Biden and Officer Brady. The handgun was subsequently confiscated from the female.

Because of their alertness in quickly locating the suspect which led to the recovery of the weapon used in the crime, Officer Biden and Officer Brady have been selected as the Hagerstown Police Department Officers of the Month for August 2017. The Hagerstown Police Department is proud to have dedicated officers such as Officer Biden and Officer Brady as some of its own and congratulates them for a job well done.

CHART NO. 2 – A&E PARKING DECK WEEKLY OCCUPANCY





CHART NO. 3 – UD PARKING DECK WEEKLY OCCUPANCY
