### DEPARTMENT OF COMMUNITY & ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

**PARKS & ENGINEERING**

**ENGINEERING DIVISION**

1. **Belview Avenue.** We advertised the contract to construct curb bump-outs on Belview Avenue with bio-retention areas. These will help slow traffic as requested by Neighborhoods 1<sup>st</sup> Group but they will also collect street gutter flow and filter it before going into the storm drain system. This is partially funded with a Green Streets Grant.
  
2. **Pavement Markings.** We advertised the contract to complete pavement markings that will be used for the annual overlay, CIP projects, maintenance of existing stopbars, crosswalks and line striping. This open-end contract has the potential of being extended for up to an additional four years if agreed to by both parties.
  
3. **Board of Traffic & Parking Recommendations:**
  - Wayside Avenue and Locust Street: Leave the traffic signal in place (we received a request to remove it).
  
  - Northern Avenue left turns at Oak Hill and Potomac: Carry over to next month but leaning toward leaving these as is (we had a request to add exclusive left-turn lanes).
  
4. **Standard Plates.** We are continually updating our "Standard Plates" for design work. These plates are our standards for construction in the public right-of-way. As we update each section they will replace the outdated ones on the website.

**Categories of Conditions**

Safety	Conditions which are or reasonably present a hazard to occupant or public. <u>Example:</u> No smoke alarms, improper wiring, handrails
Neighborhood Vitality	Conditions which cause or tend to cause diminution to property <u>Example:</u> Weeds, trash, debris, junk vehicles, deterioration of a structure.
Quality of Life	Conditions which negatively impact occupants. <u>Example:</u> Damaged surfaces, damages elements, missing screens
Preventive Maintenance	Conditions which are technical violations and need addressed to prevent deterioration. <u>Example:</u> Mortar deterioration, clogged gutters, minor rotting wood
Planning & Zoning	Conditions which violate Land Management Code requirements (zoning, forest conservation, floodplain, historic district and other requirements) and progress inspections of development projects for site plan compliance. <u>Examples:</u> Uses not permitted in property's zone, construction of new facilities, follow up inspections on open violations.

**REPORTS**

**02/01/18:** Officer C. Koontz responded to Georgia Avenue for a theft from a motor vehicle in progress. While in route, Dispatch advised the suspects were running towards the 7-11 Convenience Store on Salem Avenue. The victim stated that one of the suspects was a white male wearing a red coat with a back pack. The other suspect was wearing a black coat. Lt. Robison, who was assisting Officer C. Koontz, located the two men in the area of the 7-11 store. The men began to flee, however Lt. Robison was able to take into custody the suspect in the red coat in the area of Alexander Street. The male stated he was sorry for breaking into the parked vehicles. He was looking for loose change to purchase milk for his son. He did have \$20 of loose change on his person and it was placed in evidence at the Police Department. The male was transported to Central Booking and charged with Theft less \$100. The other male suspect has not been located at this time.

**02/02/18:** Officer Kimmel was dispatched to McComas Street for a reported malicious destruction of property. The victim advised the rear window of his 2005 Ford Taurus was damaged. The window was shattered with a rock the size of a softball and the rock was still inside the vehicle. The officer will be checking area surveillance cameras to see if the incident was captured on film. No further details are available.

**02/03/18:** Officer Weaver responded to South Locust Street for a reported burglary. The victim stated he just purchased the residence and is in the process of remodeling it. He came to the property on this date to find the interior door open that leads to the basement. He went to the basement and discovered water puddles and the copper piping was cut and removed. The officer will attempt to review a neighbor's surveillance camera to see if the incident was captured on video. No further details are available.

**02/04/18:** Officer Rowe was dispatched to Little Elliot Drive for a report of a woman yelling for help. Upon arrival the officer heard the yells from the woman but he was unable to gain access into the residence. It became apparent to the officer the front door was secured with a dead bolt. The neighbors advised the officer the woman that lives at this residence has health issues. The officer requested assistance from the Fire Department. The Fire Department responded and was able to gain access to the residence and found that the woman had taken a fall in the bathroom. The Community Rescue Service arrived on scene and transported the woman to Meritus Medical Center for treatment.

**02/05/18:** Officer Kimmel responded to West Lee Street for a reported robbery. The victim advised she was on her way home and was assaulted by four young black girls. The young girls pushed her to the ground, assaulted her in the face and took her purse. She stated the robbery occurred near Potomac Towers. The officer viewed the surveillance camera at Potomac Towers and did not see the robbery take place. It should be noted that the victim was intoxicated and was hard to understand. The officer then went to a nearby establishment, Potomac Liquors, to view their cameras. An employee stated the victim had been in the store as were two young black females. All three entered into a verbal argument which the employee found it necessary to separate them. The three individuals then left the establishment. The case will remain open in an attempt to identify the young females involved in the incident.

**OTHER NEWS/INFORMATION**

**Interviews at HPD.** This week has been busy at the Hagerstown Police Department. There were administrative interviews scheduled for Monday, February 5 and Thursday, February 8. Captain Paul Kifer and Sgt. John Lehman conducted these interviews for nine candidates desiring to become a police officer. Those nine candidates have successfully passed the written test, physical test and the panel interview. If they successfully pass the administrative interview, they will advance to the next step in the application process which is the background investigation. Factors affecting job offers include, but not limited to, how well each candidate performs in the process and the availability of open positions. The application process is competitive.

**PUBLIC WORKS**

**PARKING DECK EQUIPMENT UPDATE.** All the old equipment has been replaced with the new gates, pay stations and entry machines. New wires have been pulled or are being pulled. The project is moving along very well and quicker than expected. Training of the staff on the new equipment is tentatively scheduled for the week of February 19<sup>th</sup>. Both parking decks could be back in operation by the end of February.

**SNOW OPERATIONS.** Snow has been scarce this winter season but that does not mean there have not been any weather events. This season has been more about clipper systems, 1–2 inches of snow and freezing rain. To date, 800 tons of salt have been spread or a little less than half of what is used in a normal season. Approximately \$73,000 has been spent this season on labor, salt and vehicle repairs/maintenance excluding the storm on Wednesday February 7<sup>th</sup>. An order for 550 tons of salt has been placed at a cost of \$34,309. This will take the season’s snow cost over \$100,000 with 4 to 6 weeks of winter weather remaining.

The project continues to be on schedule.
