PARKS DIVISION

1. **City Park Play Equipment.** A selection team met to review the seven playground proposals for the south end of City Park and a small piece in the train exhibit (which we are going to brand as "City Park Train Hub"). We have narrowed the systems down to two leading candidates and we will meet with the Neighborhood Group on Tuesday to discuss.
2. **Fit Room.** The March program report is attached. Four private rentals are reserved for the Fit Room. Programs include: Beginner Yoga, Aikido for Teens and Adults, Tai Chi, Zumba, Geocaching, Yoga for Weight Loss, Slow Flow Yoga, Turbo Kick, Child and Babysitter Safety, PiYo, Shamrocks and Savasana, and Advanced Square Dancing.

Rates for the Fit Room are increasing as of March 1, 2018: 4 hour minimum rental - \$50/hour plus a \$25 administration fee.
3. **Seasonal Staff.** Applications are being taken for golf course ranger, pool cashier, and Hager House and Train Museum tour guides.
4. **Municipal Stadium.** We started rebuilding storm drains in the Municipal Stadium parking lot.
5. **Restroom Upgrades.** Work continues on upgrading the restrooms at Pangborn Park, City Park and Hellane Park.

REPORTS

02/21/18: Sgt. Hay took a report regarding theft and fraudulent activity on a citizen's bank card. The victim stated he was recently in the hospital and when he returned home he saw items that were missing from his residence. Sgt. Hay proceeded to check the RAPIDS Pawn System. One of the missing items was discovered at Spotlight Pawn. A hold was placed on the item until the owner could come to the business and properly identify the item. There are currently two persons of interest. Sgt. Hay will be obtaining video surveillance footage from the pawn shop and will be conducting further investigations.

02/23/18: Officer T. Helman responded to Ravenwood Drive for a reported fraud. The victim stated he was swindled by a gentleman selling asphalt. The suspect knocked on the victim's door and gave a sales pitch about getting a new top coat of asphalt on his driveway. The suspect quoted a price and the victim and suspect agreed on the arrangements. The victim gave a check to the suspect with the understanding the work would be done the following day. The suspect did not start the job the next day. The victim then went to his bank to see if the check had been cashed yet and found it had been cashed. The officer was able to locate a phone number for the suspect and left a voice mail requesting he stop by police headquarters. He did not come to HPD nor did he complete the asphalt work. No further details are currently available.

02/24/18: Officer McKinley was dispatched to West Baltimore Street for a reported assault. The officer arrived on scene and spoke with an individual who was initially the suspect. He stated that an intoxicated female was banging on his door and when he opened the door she fell to the floor. He claimed no assault took place. The officer located the female in the apartment complex and she was indeed intoxicated. The officer told her she needed to remain home for the night and to stop causing a disturbance. She advised she understood and would not leave her room since she was staying overnight with a friend. Later the same night, police were called to the same address for an intoxicated female causing a disturbance. It was the same female that Officer McKinley had dealt with earlier in the evening. She was placed under arrest for disturbing the peace.

02/25/18: Officer M. Anderson responded to Summit Avenue for a report of a stabbing. The victim advised that her baby's father stabbed her in the back two times with a knife. There was a verbal argument regarding money which later led to the stabbing of the victim. The suspect fled the residence in an unknown direction. The victim's two children witnessed the stabbing of their mother. The victim was transported to Meritus Medical Center for treatment. The suspect was later arrested on 02/26/18 and was charged with Assault 1st and 2nd Degree and Reckless Endangerment.

02/26/18: Officer McKinley was flagged down by a pedestrian at East Franklin Street to report a vehicle theft. The victim advised that she parked her vehicle in the bike lane on North Mulberry Street. She exited the vehicle, left the keys in the ignition, and entered the residence of a friend. She stated her cell phone was left in the vehicle as well. She returned to the vehicle about 15 minutes later to witness a white male with a brown book bag enter her vehicle and drive away. The officer stated she could call her cell phone provider and have them ping her phone. The phone was panning in the area of Virginia Avenue and the vehicle was recovered, unoccupied, in the 600 block of Highland Way. No further details are available.

02/27/18: Officer Spigler was dispatched to Mitchell Avenue for a report of juveniles trespassing in a posted no trespass area. Once the officer arrived, the victim advised that the juveniles had left her property. The victim stated the juveniles will climb the fence and then climb to the roof of the garage. The victim then stated she is fearful the juveniles will fall and hurt themselves on her property, and/or that they will do damage to her property. The following day Officer Spigler returned to the property to see if he could locate the juveniles. He saw two male juveniles sitting on top of the fence that was clearly marked "No Trespassing". The officer questioned the boys if they could read the sign and they replied they could. Both boys were charged with one count of trespassing on posted private property, transported home, and released to their respective guardians.

Happy Retirement to Lt. James Robison. On February 22, 2018, Lt. Robison said his goodbyes to his co-workers at HPD. Lt. Robison was hired by the City of Hagerstown on January 23, 1995. He was promoted to Sergeant on August 27, 2001 and promoted to Lieutenant on October 16, 2017. He served the Hagerstown City Police Department well for 23 years and he will be missed. We wish him good health and the best life has to offer during his retirement years.

Crews also completed repairs to a water main break on Greenberry Road as well as service leak repairs on Mulberry Avenue and East North Avenue. Repairs were also completed on hydrants located on Chestnut Street and Pangborn Boulevard.


