PARKS & ENGINEERING

ENGINEERING DIVISION

1. **Maryland Smart Energy Communities.** We were notified this week that we received a grant for \$38,000 to replace all exterior lights in City Park, Fairgrounds Park, and Pangborn Park with LED lights. The annual electric savings will be about \$4,000.
2. **Stormwater Utility.** We sent out letters to 15 individuals inviting them to be part of the Stormwater Advisory Committee. We will have Council appoint those who agree at the April Regular Session.

3. **Prospect Avenue Crosswalk.** Curb and sidewalk work is now complete. Installation of wireless pedestrian flashing signs will be completed once the materials arrive in April or May.
4. **Haven Road "Safe Routes to School".** We submitted the 60% drawings to State Highway for review. Comments from State Highway should be received in three to four weeks, but in the meantime staff will continue final design.
5. **Hagerstown Police Third Floor Renovation.** Staff assisted HPD in preparing an RFP to send to architects to complete the design of the third floor offices.

Safety	Conditions which are or reasonably present a hazard to occupant or public. <u>Example:</u> No smoke alarms, improper wiring, handrails
Neighborhood Vitality	Conditions which cause or tend to cause diminution to property <u>Example:</u> Weeds, trash, debris, junk vehicles, deterioration of a structure.
Quality of Life	Conditions which negatively impact occupants. <u>Example:</u> Damaged surfaces, damages elements, missing screens

REPORTS

03/23/18: Officer McKinley was dispatched to Walmart on Garland Groh Boulevard for a theft in progress. The loss prevention employee stated the suspect was fleeing the scene. Dispatch advised the suspect was driving a blue Chevrolet Blazer with Virginia tags. The officer was driving east bound on Salem Avenue and observed a vehicle that matched the description given by Dispatch. The officer received further information from Dispatch that the suspect was in the passenger side of the vehicle and was a black male with dreads and facial hair. The officer was able to get behind the vehicle and pulled the vehicle over to the shoulder. The Walmart employee emailed a photo of the suspect to the officer and the photo matched the passenger in the vehicle. The items reported stolen were located under the front seat of the vehicle, with the Walmart tags still attached. Although the suspect claimed he paid for the items he could not locate the receipt. He was arrested and charged with one count theft.

03/24/18: Officer Patterson responded to North Mulberry Street for a suspicious person. The caller advised that an older white female entered her home, sat on her sofa and then began to smoke a cigarette. The female did damage to the sofa while there. This female was unknown to the property owner. When the property owner asked the female to leave her home she refused. The female then went to the front porch. When the officer arrived he asked the female if she lived at this address and she replied that she did. The officer further asked the female to give him her address and she stated she lived on Broadway. She was informed that she was on North Mulberry Street and not Broadway. It was apparent that the female was intoxicated and did not realize she was not on Broadway. She was arrested and charged with Burglary 4th Degree, Trespass Private Property and Malicious Destruction of Property.

03/25/18: Officer Hill was dispatched to Ridge Avenue for a reported theft from a motor vehicle. The victim stated that his black Ignite BB Gun was missing from his trunk. The victim advised he must have forgotten to secure his vehicle for the night since there were no signs of forced entry to the vehicle. This break-in may be connected to the other thefts that occurred on Ridge Avenue. No further details are available at this time.

03/26/18: Officer Vogel responded to South Potomac Street for a report of a burglary. The caller is a contractor and he stated that his tools had been stolen from the house he was hired to renovate. The contractor advised the house is unoccupied and at the end of each day he would leave his tools on-site and secure the house. On 03/24/18 the contractor received a call from a neighbor to the house being renovated. The neighbor stated that he noticed the door was open and the contractor asked him to secure the door and he did. On 03/25/18 the neighbor called the contractor again to advise there were two white males walking around in the yard. The next day the tools were missing from the residence. The value of the stolen tools was over \$2,000. The officer will attempt to check local pawn shops for the stolen items. No further details are available

Seasonal Staff: Additional staff will begin work on Monday, April 2nd to assist with laborious projects such as mowing, weeding, landscaping, trash collection, painting, etc. These employees will be paid minimum wage and be on the payroll no longer than 7 months based on the AFSCME 1540 contract regarding seasonal employment.

University District Parking Deck Up and Running: The UD Parking Deck will go into operation on Wednesday, March 28th. The back entrance will remain closed for now. The contractor ran into issues physically pulling the wires to the rear entrance due to electrical conduit damage. New conduit will need to be installed to get the wires back to the rear entrance. Staff felt it more important to place the main entrance in operation and then work to get the rear entrance working.

This company has a gorgeous catalog you can request and a large selection of heirloom, Asian, and European seeds.


Southern Exposure Seed Exchange




WHAT TO DO IN MARCH:
