1. **Construction Starts This Week.**

The July 12 meeting was canceled.

Training and Development: Steve Bockmiller, Megan Flick and Department Intern Nathan Abel attended the annual Maryland Chapter APA Conference which was held on June 27 in Annapolis. One of the programs offered was conducted by the Maryland State Arts Council regarding “A&E Districts and Public Art.” Hagerstown’s work with its A&E District and the Cultural Trail were featured prominently in the presentation and the presenters raved about Hagerstown and the speed with which we developed and executed the concept and construction.

Hagerstown History Promotion: Steve Bockmiller was asked by representatives of Monocacy National Battlefield to assist with creating a temporary exhibit on the ransoms conducted in this region by the Confederate army in 1864 (Hagerstown, Frederick, Middletown, Westminster, Chambersburg, and Hancock). The exhibit opened on Saturday, July 7th and will run through October. Steve gave two talks to park visitors on the Hagerstown ransom on Saturday when the exhibit opened. Hagerstown’s story is the most prominently featured of the six towns and includes artifacts from local banks and the Washington County Historical Society. The Monocacy National Battlefield Visitor Center is located on Urbana Pike on the southern edge of Frederick. Copies of the Hagerstown/Rose Hill Cemetery Walking Tour Map were provided to the park for distribution at its information desk. No city resources were expended on this project.

REPORTS

07/05/18: Officer Koontz responded to Alexander Street for the report of a theft from a motor vehicle. The victim stated that her Kate Spade purse, wallet and other important cards had been stolen from her vehicle during the night. The victim and her family began to search the neighborhood for the purse which contained other personal belongings. Some items were recovered from a trash can in a nearby alley. The value of the missing items is approximately \$420. There is no suspect at this time.

07/06/18: Officer McKinley was dispatched to HPD Headquarters to take a report for a possible fraud. The victim advised he received notification from his bank that his PIN number had been changed. He stated he did not change his PIN and realized his account had been compromised. He contacted the bank and a representative informed him there were already fraudulent charges of \$300 made to his account. There is no suspect at this time.

07/07/18: Officer Daveler responded to Maryland Avenue for a report of a \$100 counterfeit bill. An employee stated that a female entered the store and purchased several items and gave her a \$100 bill. She marked the bill and the color revealed the bill was counterfeit. At that point the employee would not accept the bill as payment and the police were called. The customer advised she did not remember where she received the bill. The \$100 bill was confiscated and submitted to the Western Regional Crime Lab for testing. No further details are available.

07/08/18: Officer Brady was dispatched to Sheetz on East Washington Street for a reported lost cell phone. The victim explained to the officer that he was getting a drink at Sheetz and laid the phone down at the Slushie Machine. After paying for the drink he left the store. A short time later he realized he left his phone at the drink counter. When he returned to Sheetz, the phone was no longer there. Sheetz employees advised that no phone had been turned in. Later that day the victim's ex-wife tried to reach him on the cell phone but an unknown male voice answered. The male indicated that if she wanted the phone back she needed to pay him \$50. The male then hung up. The investigation is continuing.

07/09/18: Officer Patterson discovered that Universal Laundry on East Franklin Street had items inside that were damaged. The officer was walking in the area on another call for service when he saw that there were overturned laundry machines inside the business. Upon further investigation he also found two overturned soda machines, control buttons ripped from one machine, the coin detergent machine had been ripped off of the wall, and three laundry machines had the front covers ripped off and thrown in the corner. The officer contacted the manager of the business and she stated she would contact the owner to get an approximate value of the damaged items. There were no witnesses and there are no suspects at this time.

PARKING CHANGES FOR DISCOUNT COUPONS. Parking no longer sells discounted coupons or what is known as chaser tickets for the parking decks. The new option is web validations. Businesses can sign up to validate parking at a 20% discount. For example, if 1 hour of parking cost \$1, the business pays \$0.80. Validations are completed online by the businesses and an invoice is sent to each business for the total amount of validated parking at the end of each month. Currently, there are 14 businesses and government entities validating parking.

CHART NO. 2 – A&E PARKING DECK WEEKLY OCCUPANCY





CHART NO. 3 – UD PARKING DECK WEEKLY OCCUPANCY




