PARKS & ENGINEERING

ENGINEERING DIVISION

1. **Safety Audits.** Staff participated in this conference call and the Metropolitan Planning Organization is going to do a Traffic Safety Audit on the following corridors in the City: East Avenue, Washington Street, Jonathan Street and North Locust Street. The audits will start in October and the report is due in May of 2019. The State also approved us for a pedestrian and bicycle safety study area of the downtown. More details on that to follow.
2. **Prospect Avenue Crosswalk.** The pushbutton flashing crosswalk lights will be operational by Friday, August 31st and we will test them before school opens on September 4th.
3. **Municipal Stadium.** The parking lot was slurry-paved and new pavement markings completed before the team returned to Hagerstown. This will extend the life of the pavement without costly overlay. The Ice Rink parking lot was also slurry-paved and Funkhouser Park parking lot was overlaid.
4. **Bike Grant.** We are sending drawings to State Highway for seven streets where we plan to use the grant to add bike lanes or sharrows.
5. **Frederick Manor.** Met with Bester Community of Hope and residents of Frederick Manor to discuss traffic calming issues. We developed a plan they are agreeable to and hope to implement in a week or two.

1. Train Hub.

- Work continues on installing the new play equipment at the City Park Train Museum.
- The two cabooses sold were removed from the site on Tuesday, August 28th. Six cabooses remain.



2. **Thomas Kennedy Park.** Installation of footings for the park benches and electrical conduit are in progress.
3. **Washington Goes Purple Prep.** Purple lenses were placed in the fountain at University Plaza to recognize Washington Goes Purple during the month of September.
4. **Hager House.** Staff will be developing a site Master Plan to address new program development and maintenance needs for the Hager House over the next six months, one year and five years. Staff are looking into grant opportunities to revamp exhibits inside the Museum, and working in partnership with the Historical Society to plan for inventorying and care of artifacts.
5. **Fit Room.** Attached is the Fit Room schedule as of August 30, 2018. A private rental is reserved for Saturday, September 1st from 4-9 p.m. A new Hip Hop Soul Class begins on Sunday, September 2nd.
6. **Potterfield Pool.** Last day open for public swim is Labor Day, Monday, September 3rd. The Humane Society Pooch Plunge is scheduled for Wednesday, September 5th at 6 p.m.

REPORTS

08/23/18: Officer Young responded to Virginia Avenue for a report of a theft. The victim stated that she received confirmation that her Amazon package had been delivered to her home, however when she arrived home from work the package was not there. The victim advised that her neighbor has a surveillance camera and perhaps the camera captured the theft. The camera revealed a black male wearing a dark colored shirt, light colored jeans and white shoes on the victim's porch. He walked away carrying a large box in his arms. The total value of the stolen items is \$106. The victim did not recognize the male on camera. The officer will attempt to identify the suspect. No further information is available at this time.

08/24/18: Officer Patterson was dispatched to Wood Street for a reported fraud. The victim advised that on his last bank statement he noticed some charges and withdrawals on the account that he did not authorize. His wife is also on the account and she could not locate her card. He thought perhaps she just misplaced the card so he did not contact the bank right away to cancel the card. The victim is suspicious that a family member could be the suspect so he is reluctant to prosecute. The bank explained to the victim the steps that need to be taken for him to be refunded the money. The officer will conduct a follow up at the locations the card was used by the suspect. No further details are available.

08/26/18: Officer Thompson responded to South Potomac Street for the report of a burglary. The victim advised that she rents a shed and the owner of the shed contacted her to let her know that someone had broken into the shed. He advised her to check to see if anything of hers was missing. The victim advised she looked and discovered that a purple Calvin Klein jacket valued at \$150 is missing. The owner of the shed did not have a surveillance camera. There are no suspects at this time.

08/27/18: Officer Eichelberger was dispatched to Little Elliott Drive for an attempted robbery. The victim advised a male struck him and attempted to take his wallet while in the parking lot on Little Elliott Drive. The victim fell to the ground and a struggle took place while the suspect attempted to remove the wallet from the pocket of the victim. During the struggle, the wallet fell to the ground. Unable to locate the wallet, the suspect took off running North through the parking lot. The victim later located the wallet which had fallen under his car. The officer took pictures of the scratch marks on the victim's lower back which occurred when he was pushed to the ground by the suspect. There were no witnesses and no additional information is available.

08/29/18: Officer Decker responded to Wonder Book on the Dual Highway for an attempted strong arm robbery. The victim advised an unknown male approached him from behind and placed his arm around his neck. The suspect demanded money but the victim stated he had no money. The suspect then demanded the victim's debit card but the victim would not give the pin number to the account. The suspect fled around the Wonder Book building. The suspect is described as a small, thin, white male with short brown hair. He was wearing tan pants with grey underwear sticking from the top of the pants. The officers checked the area but were not successful in locating the suspect. No further information is available.

CHART NO. 2 – A&E PARKING DECK WEEKLY OCCUPANCY





CHART NO. 3 – UD PARKING DECK WEEKLY OCCUPANCY

Building Maintenance. Staff worked on cleaning up issues from the flooding of the Elizabeth Hager Center. Water got into the MOSH office from the heavy rains that occurred on Tuesday. There were no major issues but two offices had water cover their carpets. Servpro was also called in to dry out the carpet and eventually clean the carpet.

Signal and Sign

- Work has begun on the installation of ornamental sign posts at the intersection S. Prospect Street & Baltimore Street. The Neighborhood's 1st group purchased the posts and city staff is completing the installation and creating the new street signs.
- Councilmember Emily Keller along with three volunteers assisted staff in the installation of more than 50 purple rope lights in the downtown on the decorative street light posts. The lights are to recognize and bring attention to the opioid epidemic. Placards were also installed recognizing those that sponsored the lights and those affected by the epidemic. The lights will be lit from 7 p.m. to 7 a.m. through the month of September.

Street

- Crews cleared the bridges of flood debris on Magnolia Street and Pangborn Boulevard. After each large storm, tree limbs and brush will get washed against the culvert pipes blocking the water flow. Additional flooding the local area can occur if not cleared.
