 - 758 and 760 Bowman Avenue – Antraquip Corporation– final plat to create a new Lot H.

2. **Zoning Certificates Issued:**

3. **Planning Commission:** The Planning Commission considered these projects on September 26:

 - Antraquip Corporation – 758 Bowman Avenue – approved a site plan for an addition and a new warehouse.
 - McCleary Hill – approved a development plan for a new housing project.

Wantz, Esquire – special exception to expand the church parking lot onto an adjacent parcel; and change of a nonconforming use to create four residential units in the former First Church of Christ, Scientist, building.

INSPECTIONS KEY:

Categories of Conditions

Safety	Conditions which are or reasonably present a hazard to occupant or public.
	<u>Example:</u> No smoke alarms, improper wiring, handrails
Neighborhood Vitality	Conditions which cause or tend to cause diminution to property
	<u>Example:</u> Weeds, trash, debris, junk vehicles, deterioration of a structure.
Quality of Life	Conditions which negatively impact occupants.
	<u>Example:</u> Damaged surfaces, damages elements, missing screens
Preventive Maintenance	Conditions which are technical violations and need addressed to prevent deterioration.
	<u>Example:</u> Mortar deterioration, clogged gutters, minor rotting wood
Planning & Zoning	Conditions which violate Land Management Code requirements (zoning, forest conservation, floodplain, historic district and other requirements) and progress inspections of development projects for site plan compliance.
	<u>Examples:</u> Uses not permitted in property's zone, construction of new facilities, follow up inspections on open violations.

PARKS & ENGINEERING

ENGINEERING DIVISION

1. **Safe Routes to School Grant.** We received word from State Highway that we received a \$156,000 grant for miscellaneous safety improvements including:
 - Permanent speed display signs on Maryland Avenue to advise drivers of their speed.
 - Complete sidewalk widening; safety railing and lighting on West Memorial Boulevard.
 - Install a mid-block crosswalk beacon on Northern Avenue at Fountaindale Elementary School.

2. **2018 Alley Reconstruction.** The contractor poured most of Alley 2-67 and covered it with plastic. The wind blew some plastic off and rain washed over four panels of alley mat that the contractor will replace at his expense. We also met with manager of Moller Apartments to resolve several concerns he had.

3. **Pool.** Staff advertised a contract for replacing filters and splashpad amenities at Potterfield Pool. This is CDBG-funded.

4. **UIP Update.** Conduit installation is slow going due to bedrock and an array of existing underground conduits. We are hoping to be finished by the end of October.



3. **Hager House.** There is a new tour and exhibit at the Hager House this Fall! The Museum will feature historic photographs of the process, some of which have never been viewed by the public before.

REPORTS

09/20/18: Sergeant Lewis received an email from an Acting Field Supervisor from Parole and Probation. The supervisor advised that on September 18, 2018, an offender they monitor called Parole & Probation and made threats to kill the supervisor and another employee. The supervisor immediately requested a parole retake warrant for the offender. The offender called the Parole and Probation to complain regarding a dispute he had with his agent handling his home visits. The call did not meet the offender's expectations and he became irate. On September 21st the offender was arrested in Pennsylvania on the parole retake warrant. The case is now closed.

09/21/18: Sergeant Hay, along with other HPD officers, responded to George Street concerning a disturbance in the street. When Sergeant Hay arrived he observed a male and a female in a verbal argument screaming and yelling at each other. At that point, the male struck the female. An assisting officer was placing the male in handcuffs when the female come over and struck the male in custody. It was later determined that the male and female reside together and have children in common. Both were transported to Central Booking and charged with Assault 2nd Degree and Disorderly Conduct.

09/23/18: Officer Fuqua was dispatched to Reynolds Avenue for a report of malicious destruction of property to a vehicle. The victim stated that someone had slashed all four of her tires on her 2002 Honda Civic. The officer observed all four tires to be flat but no other damage to the vehicle. The victim advised she had no idea who may have slashed the tires. There are no suspects or witnesses.

09/24/18: Officer Rowe responded to Magma Court for a report of a theft from a motor vehicle. The victim stated that she was missing \$60 in US currency and several children's DVD's from the vehicle. The US currency was removed from the glove box and the DVD's were removed from the back seat of the vehicle. The victim advised the vehicle was unsecured since she had the vehicle parked in her driveway. There are no suspects at this time.

09/25/18: Officer Delicati, and other officers from the Hagerstown Police Department, responded to Public Square for a report of an assault with a knife. The victim stated that two males and a female jumped him. The incident started with an argument which led to a physical altercation. The argument continued and one male pulled out a knife and was swinging it at the victim. They continued to fight until the assault moved into the street. The incident was captured on a City camera and was submitted as evidence. All three suspects were arrested and charged with 1st and 2nd Degree Assault.

CHART NO. 2 – A&E PARKING DECK WEEKLY OCCUPANCY





CHART NO. 3 – UD PARKING DECK WEEKLY OCCUPANCY

ELECTRIC DIVISION

Engineering

- Multiple permit reviews, underground locates, and service upgrade requests have been reviewed and/or completed by engineering staff.

- Multiple projects for improvements to HLD overhead distribution facilities were engineered by staff.

- Engineering began for underground high voltage installation upgrades to legacy installations. This will provide sectionalizing capabilities in the event of both planned and unplanned outages to reduce the number of electric customers affected.

- Prior to HLD acceptance, contractor installed streetlighting systems were evaluated for any issues. Multiple installations are not operational and do not meet HLD specification. These will be reported to the contractor and repairs/amendments will be required.

Administration

- The annual statistical sampling of electric revenue meters by each homogeneous group was completed by staff and the results were reported to the State's Regulatory group for evaluation and review.
- Members of each group within the HLD continue to meet weekly to discuss and review each section of the Safety Manual for updates to industry standards that comply with our operations.
