DEPARTMENT OF COMMUNITY & ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Main Street Update: Main Street Hagerstown hosted their first Pop Up Trivia Event in downtown at Jerry's Subs and Pizza. Three teams participated and the top two teams won coupons to Jerry's. The next event will be March 5th at 28 South with registration starting at 6:30 p.m.

IEDC: Danelle Hayer attended two International Economic Development Council courses this week in Baltimore, MD. The two courses included Business Retention and Expansion along with Workforce Development Strategies. Danelle is working towards becoming a Certified Economic Developer (CEcD). Economic Development colleagues from Frederick City, Frederick County and the Department of Commerce also attended.

Job Fair: The City hosted a Procter and Gamble Open House and Job Fair on Wednesday, February 27th at the Washington County Free Library. Approximately 75 people attended. P&G recently opened a warehouse in Martinsburg, WV, and is hiring plant technicians to work in its new 24/7 Tabler Station manufacturing facility. DCED staff coordinated the event with P&G representatives.

Chamber Award Dinner: DCED staff and City elected officials attended the 20th Annual Business Awards Banquet held by the Hagerstown-Washington County Chamber of Commerce. Four of the six award winners are located in the City. Winners included: Large Business of the Year (Middletown Valley Bank), Small Business of the Year (Worx Graphic Design), Non-Profit of the Year (Discovery Station), Young Professional of the Year (Michael Fitzgerald) and Business Person of the Year (Randy Scott). DCED was a sponsor of the event.

Grand Opening: Hagerstown Infusion had a grand opening on Wednesday, February 27th. Councilmember McIntire officiated over the ribbon cutting. Sarah Roth from Congressman Trone's office was also in attendance. Hagerstown Infusion is a free-standing center that provides infusion therapy for many conditions. The center is located at 1829 Howell Road, Suite 2B.

1. **Mulberry at Antietam.** On Sunday night an accident occurred at this intersection that knocked down one of the old traffic signals. The contractor had planned to activate the new signals on Wednesday, but was able to activate them on Tuesday morning. The new signal is in full operation.
2. **Memorial at Reynolds.** We are reviewing several options related to solving a cut-thru traffic issue. As a training for new inspector and as a refresher for the designers we viewed two webinars about ADA sidewalk ramps.
3. **Carr Street and First Street.** We are in the process of designing sidewalks on these two streets and expect to advertise for bids the later part of March. These will be funded by CDBG.

REPORTS

02/21/19: Officer Kimmel and Officer Young responded to North Potomac Street for a disturbance. The victim stated that she and her boyfriend were in an argument that turned physical. The victim stated that boyfriend assaulted her numerous times and placed a knife to her throat. She stated he also destroyed her cell phone. The victim's daughter attempted to separate the two and was assaulted by the suspect as well. Both the victim and her daughter refused medical treatment. The officer charged the suspect with two counts of Assault 2nd Degree and one count of Malicious Destruction of Property. No further information is available at this time.

02/22/19: Officer Delicati was on patrol in the area of Dual Highway and Eastern Boulevard when he noticed a white vehicle with Maryland tags weaving between two lanes. The vehicle was traveling on top of the center line and then swerved to the shoulder of the roadway. The officer pulled the driver over and as he approached the driver's side window he could smell alcohol. The driver gave the officer the requested paperwork but became confused at times. The officer asked the driver if he had been drinking and the driver stated he had been. The officer then requested the driver to exit his vehicle to perform the field sobriety test. As the driver exited his vehicle he was unsteady on his feet. After several failed tests the officer terminated the testing and placed the driver of the vehicle in the cruiser for transport to the Hagerstown Police Department. The driver agreed to a breath test and was subsequently arrested and charged with Driving While Under the Influence of Alcohol, Driving While Under the Influence of Alcohol Per Se, Driving While Impaired by Alcohol. In addition to those charges, he received several traffic citations.

02/23/19: Officer Todaro was dispatched to Potomac Heights in response to a burglary. The caller stated his son, who is not on the lease and does not pay rent, has been ordered not to trespass on the property. The caller stated the son had thrown a brick through several windows and gained access into the residence. While trying to detain the son until police arrived, the son assaulted the father. It should be noted that HPD has been called to this residence several times in the past due to the son's behavior. The son was arrested and charged with Home Invasion, Burglary 4th Degree, Assault 2nd Degree and Malicious Destruction of Property.

02/24/19: Officer Weaver responded to South Potomac Street for a reported overdose. The officer found a white female lying on the living room floor. The woman was breathing however responded by eye contact only. Another female that was present stated the female on the floor was her mother. The daughter stated she spoke to her mother by telephone about 20 minutes earlier and her mother stated she had just smoked something that was not marijuana and was not feeling right. The daughter informed the police that her mother said she smoked a leafy substance with a lot of seeds. Due to the description of the substance, the officer suspected it could be Spice (K2). The Community Rescue Service arrived and transported the mother to Mertius Medical Center for treatment. No further details are available.

02/25/19: Officer Bartles was dispatched to The Boys and Girls Club of Washington County located at Nolan Village for a reported disturbance and a possible stabbing. When the officer arrived on scene, he found a large group of individuals around a silver Mitsubishi. Inside the vehicle were five males and two of males had stab wounds. The driver of the vehicle stated he was getting ready to take the two injured males to the hospital. One victim advised HPD that he knew the suspect who had stabbed them. The officer stated that an ambulance had been called and they would transport the individuals to Meritus Medical Center for treatment. The three remaining males in the vehicle were uncooperative with the police. The area director of the Boy's and Girl's Club stated he was familiar with the two victims and the suspect. It should be noted that the suspect and both of the victims are juveniles. This case has been forwarded to the HPD Criminal Investigative Unit and Juvenile Services.

OTHER NEWS/INFORMATION

HPD Schedules Applicant Panel Interviews. Police applicant panel interviews are scheduled for February 28 & March 1, 2019. There are 13 applicants who have advanced to the panel interview segment of the police hiring process. The interviews will be held at the Hagerstown Police Department Headquarters. Interviewers for February 28th are Sergeant Scott Leeney, Officer Bricker-Hill and Officer Alec Routhier. Interviewers for March 1st are Sergeant Eric Knode, Officer Bartles and Officer William Decker.

Most law enforcement agencies include an oral interview with the applicant and will involve more than one interviewer. There are typically two parts to the police oral interview. The first part examines the applicant's personality and if they would make a good police officer. The second part of the oral interview involves scenario type questions that test judgment and problem-solving capabilities. This personal interview will also be used to test an applicant's verbal skills and get an idea of the applicant's overall reasoning abilities and common sense.

PLANNING & CODE ADMINISTRATION

Planning Commission: The Planning Commission reviewed these matters on February 27:

- 1350 Marshall Street – Washington County Public Schools – approved a site plan for bus loop and security improvements; and related forest conservation plan.
- 955 Sweeney Drive – conducted a workshop for waiver requests for a warehouse addition.
- Approved updated bylaws.
- 2018 Land Management Code Amendments – agreed to recommend to the Mayor and City Council that the PUD portion of the package of amendments be removed to allow for further study and review.

Board of Zoning Appeals: No cases were received for the March 20 hearing.

CHART NO. 2 – A&E PARKING DECK WEEKLY OCCUPANCY





CHART NO. 3 – UD PARKING DECK WEEKLY OCCUPANCY

AFTER HOUR CALL BACKS

- Saturday 2/23/19 @ 11 p.m.: Fueling station at Public Works went offline. Staff went to site to reboot system and restore operations.

- Sunday 2/24/19 @ 11:30 a.m.: Traffic signal destroyed at Mulberry Street and Antietam Street due to a two vehicle accident. The signal pole that was knocked down was an older pole that is being replaced with new overhead traffic signals. Staff was brought in to cap the electrical wires and remove the damaged pole.
- Sunday 2/24/19 @ 8:30 p.m.: Tree was blown over from a traffic island blocking the street on Wilson Boulevard at Spruce Street. An employee was brought on site to cut the tree and remove it from the street.
- Sunday 2/24/19 @ 10:48 p.m.: 9-1-1 call that a traffic signal head at Jefferson Boulevard and Eastern Boulevard was twisted from the high winds. An inspection of the traffic signals showed no issues.
- Overall, issues were very few considering the 24 hours of high winds experienced in the area. Besides the tree on Wilson Boulevard, there were only a few other tree issues discovered on Monday the 25th and one other traffic signal issue with a broken signal head.




1 "The Fishing Lesson"
This bronze sculpture created by Paul Byrner mirrors the teaching relationship of parent and child while also subtly educating onlookers about the chain of life and the importance of teaching self-sufficiency. Visit the Museum of Fine Arts for the accompanying children's book about the boat.




2 "Pod"
This cold, white granite sculpture was hand-carved by Richard Dutch in Italy where Michelangelo's studio was located. Inspired by both the re-birth of nature and the ruins of Rome, this modern work is the marriage of art and environment. It invites reflection and creative play.



3 Community Art
This green space features temporary community art.



7 "Railroad Switch"
Stroll down the trail and see the abstract-cut weathering steel fence that makes memories of the rail yard switches that once ran through the area. Artist Vicki Searl designed this functional fencing, which seems to move and pulse in the sunlight as you pass it.



8 Mural of Unusual Size — "Building Blocks"
Internationally recognized contemporary public artist and award-winning painter HERSE transforms this former industrial building into a creative work of art that combines techniques of street art and abstract painting.



10 "Faces of Hagerstown"
These black-and-white photos capture the truth and life of Hagerstown through the people who live, work, and play here. These candid images are submitted by all levels of photographers — from the iPhone amateur to the seasoned pro.



11 "This Little Light of Mine"
A great location for "slices," this mural by Eric B. Bick depicts geometric designs, the beauty of nature, and "Maryland" themes in honor of the nearby University. Look for the string art and the 3-D butterflies.



5 "The Fantastical Garden"
Explore this interactive play area that features a garden you can touch and smell. Designed by artist Allison Spahr, large stone elements of surprise. Take a closer look to see what "line" among the garden's work is complemented by a butterfly garden, native rocks, and a trickling water feature.



6 "Rivulet"
An intricate sculpture by Bernice de Witte, the forms of the sculpture are suspended in the air, creating a sense of movement and flow. The viewer is welcome to place themselves either mentally or physically in the flow.

9 "Rise"
