
PARKS & ENGINEERING

ENGINEERING DIVISION

1. **UIP Update.** The Phase I portion of the Plaza project is substantially complete. The last aerial wires were removed this week and City Electric will soon remove the poles. Many thanks to all involved.

2. **Haven Road Safe Routes to School.** We finally received the approval from State Highway to advertise this project. We are hoping the bids can be approved by SHA in time to complete the sidewalk work at Pennsylvania Avenue and Fairview Road during summer months.
3. **Columbia Gas Work on Northern Avenue.** Columbia Gas will begin a major project of replacing the gas main in Northern Avenue from Potomac Street to Pennsylvania Avenue. Work will start at the Potomac Street end and take several months to complete.
4. **MHT Grant for Fairgrounds Park.** Staff submitted a \$75,000 grant request to the Maryland Historic Trust to stabilize the entrance building and gatekeepers house in Fairgrounds Park.

PARKS DIVISION

1. **Municipal Stadium.** During a recent inspection, we found over 40 rusted bench supports on the 3rd base bleachers. We are working on welding new brackets in place, painting, and board replacement before the April opener.
2. **Vietnam Veterans Memorial.** Located on Walnut Lane, we assisted with the installation of a new Vietnam Veterans Memorial. The ribbon cutting ceremony was held Friday at 12 p.m..
3. **Cannon Returns.** The Mt. Aetna cannon was preserved and was on display at the Yorktown Battlefield since November of 2107. It will return to the Hager House on Tuesday, April 2nd. Staff will create a new mount and interpretive plaque southeast of the house along the Walking Trail using grant funds we recently obtained.
4. **Golf Course.** Beginning April 1st, the Golf Course operating hours are 7 a.m. - Dark. Work continues on new sand traps, laying sod and other improvements.
5. **Fit Room Classes & Rentals for April.** The schedule for April is attached.

Quality of Life	Conditions which negatively impact occupants. Example: Damaged surfaces, damages elements, missing screens
Preventive Maintenance	Conditions which are technical violations and need addressed to prevent deterioration. Example: Mortar deterioration, clogged gutters, minor rotting wood

REPORTS

03/21/19: Officer Molineaux was dispatched to West Franklin Street for a reported stolen vehicle. The officer had spoken to the victim earlier in the day and at that point in time the individual did not want to report the vehicle as stolen. The victim changed her mind and decided she wanted to report her 2003 gold Oldsmobile Alero as stolen. She stated she had loaned the vehicle to her boyfriend who had failed to return the vehicle and was also not answering his cell phone. The victim is the only registered owner of the vehicle. The officer complied and entered the vehicle into NCIC as stolen. No further details are available at this time.

03/22/19: Officer Thompson was dispatched to McDonalds on East Washington Street for the report of a driver that had fallen asleep while in the drive-thru lane. When the officer arrived he noticed the vehicle had the four way lights on. McDonalds customers were honking their horns to get the driver to move forward. The driver did arouse and moved the vehicle forward. At that time the officer parked next to the order line and was waiting until the driver paid and received her food order. However, the driver attempted to exit the drive-thru line without paying for or receiving her food. With this exit attempt she nearly struck the parked cruiser. At this point the officer activated his emergency lights and stopped the vehicle. The officer asked the driver why she had her four way lights on for which she replied she did not know. When asked to present her driver's license, she presented her credit card. The officer inquired if she had been drinking any alcoholic beverages and she replied she had two drinks earlier in the evening however she could not recall where she had the drinks. Due to the weather conditions, the officer decided to transport the driver to HPD to conduct Standardized Field Sobriety Testing. Due to the results of the testing, the officer charged the driver with Driving Under the Influence of Alcohol, Driving Under the Influence of Alcohol per se and Driving While Impaired by Alcohol.

03/23/19: Officer Routhier responded to South Potomac Street for the report of an assault with a knife. Upon arrival, the officer observed the victim to have a shallow laceration on his neck. The victim explained that his cousin lives with him and is the suspect. He further explained that he and his cousin had a verbal disagreement and the cousin became angry and started swinging a knife at him striking him in the neck. The cousin then fled the residence. The victim was treated by Community Rescue Service but refused transport to Meritus Medical Center. The officer will be charging the suspect with Assault 1st and 2nd Degree. No further information available.

03/24/19: Officer Campbell was dispatched to South Cannon Avenue for the report of a heroin overdose. A friend at the scene stated that the victim had gone to the bathroom and had not returned for a long period of time. Knowing that his friend has a history of substance abuse, he knocked on the bathroom door. When his friend did not respond or open the door, the friend called 911. Community Rescue Service responded and found the male unconscious in the bathroom. Narcan was administered and the male regained consciousness. A syringe and a small bag of suspected heroin were found in the bathroom and both were packaged and placed into evidence. The overdosed male was transported to Meritus Medical Center for treatment. Agent Jurado of the Narcotics Task Force will be handling the investigation.

03/25/19: Officer Salahov responded to West Baltimore Street for the report of an armed robbery. The victim stated he was robbed at gunpoint by two males in the alley area of South Potomac Street. He advised the officer that as he was walking down the alley, two black males exited a black vehicle and approached him. One of the males had a handgun in each hand and demanded the victim to give him everything he had. The other male then began to check the victim's pockets and took his Maryland ID, his rings and his knife. The suspects told the victim to leave the area and advised him not to call the police. The officer forwarded the case to the Criminal Investigation Unit due to another robbery which occurred in the same area within the same week. The investigation is on-going.

OTHER NEWS/INFORMATION

Congratulations to Lieutenant Mark Renner. Sergeant Mark Renner was promoted to Police Lieutenant on Tuesday, March 26, 2019. He was sworn in by Mayor Robert Bruchey in Council Chamber at City Hall. In attendance were Chief Kifer, Captain Langston, Captain Alexander, co-workers and friends. Lt. Renner was pleased that his parents, wife, daughters and grandson were able to attend the ceremony.

Lt. Renner came to the Hagerstown Police Department in 1982 as a Cadet and was later sworn in as an Officer. He remained assigned to the Patrol Division until 1992 when he was reassigned to the Criminal Investigation Unit (CIU) as a Detective. He served in CIU under Lt. Voytko for six years and then was promoted to Sergeant in 1998 where he was reassigned back to the Patrol Division.

Lt. Renner has received many awards throughout his law enforcement career. He has received numerous Commendation Letters, Award of Merit Second Degree, and three Unit Citations. He also was recognized as Supervisor of the Year in 2016 and Sergeant of the Year in 2018. Now his most impressive accomplishment is his promotion to Lieutenant. We wish him much success in his new assignment as Lieutenant of Alpha Platoon in the Patrol Division of the Hagerstown Police Department.

CHART NO. 2 – A&E PARKING DECK WEEKLY OCCUPANCY





CHART NO. 3 – UD PARKING DECK WEEKLY OCCUPANCY
