ENGINEERING DIVISION


1. **North Cannon Avenue.** Having received a request from citizens to make North Cannon Avenue between Franklin Street and Jefferson Boulevard one-way northbound, we engaged our traffic consultant and we completed turn counts at six intersections. Staff hopes to present findings to the Board of Traffic & Parking in May.

2. **“Tourist Attraction Corridor” Sign Program.** Tim Young, along with Dan Spedden, attended the semi-final review meeting in Baltimore at the State Highway Administration. A concept was approved in 2016 but they tell us they expect the signs to be installed by Fall of 2020. The purpose of this program is to establish similar tourism signs on interstates and local streets to better guide visitors. Most of the existing signs we have up will be removed and replaced with new signs.
3. **Jamison Door Company.** Staff met with officials from Jamison Door Company to discuss the alley and wall along the east side of their property. This wall has been an issue for years (built in 1955). We are doing a property survey and researching historic agreements related to the area around the business.

PARKS DIVISION

1. **100 Miler Finale.** Join us for the Final Mile Celebration & Wellness Expo on Saturday, April 27th!! The final mile walk will begin at 9:30 a.m. along the Hagerstown Cultural Trail at the Antietam Street entrance. The Wellness Expo will follow from 10 a.m. until 2 p.m. in the Press Room at The Herald-Mail (located at 100 Summit Avenue, Hagerstown). The 100 Miler Grand Prizes will be announced. This year we had approximately 1,300 people participate!
2. **Arbor Day.** Arbor Day will be celebrated and recognized Friday, April 26th at 11 a.m. at the Hager House in City Park. School children will learn about the importance of trees and environmental preservation to help keep the air we breathe clean for future generations. They will also help plant and care for trees at the Hager House. A program for this celebration is attached.
3. **City Park Train Hub.** The City Park Train Hub opens for the season this Friday, April 26th! Hours of operation are Friday and Saturday from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Standard admission rates apply. We are also booking parties at the new pavilion which holds up to 125 people!!
4. **Fit Room Report.** The scheduled for May 2019 is attached.
5. **Parks Projects.**
 - **City Park Restroom:** The remodeled restroom is complete with all new fixtures, LED lighting, and flooring.



- **Potterfield Pool:** We're replacing the skimmers. We will soon repaint the locker rooms and reinstall the benches.
- **City Park:** Funded by Program Open Space, installation of the new play equipment in the south end continues.
- **Train Hub:** We repaired the paved area in front of the Train Pavilion.
- **Grounds Maintenance:** Re-seeding and mulching continues in all our parks and playgrounds.

Safety	Conditions which are or reasonably present a hazard to occupant or public. <u>Example:</u> No smoke alarms, improper wiring, handrails
Neighborhood Vitality	Conditions which cause or tend to cause diminution to property <u>Example:</u> Weeds, trash, debris, junk vehicles, deterioration of a structure.
Quality of Life	Conditions which negatively impact occupants. <u>Example:</u> Damaged surfaces, damages elements, missing screens
Preventive Maintenance	Conditions which are technical violations and need addressed to prevent deterioration. <u>Example:</u> Mortar deterioration, clogged gutters, minor rotting wood

REPORTS

04/18/19: Officer T. Helman responded to George Street at approximately 9 p.m. for a reported disturbance. The complaint advised a large crowd was standing in the street listening to loud music, drinking and causing a disturbance. It should be noted that this was the third time the police had responded to this area since 4 p.m. The officer observed a male leaning against a parked vehicle drinking from a liquor bottle. The officer knew the male due to the prior calls to this area. The male began to yell and the officer ordered the male to stop yelling and to get rid of his alcoholic beverage. A female by-stander got involved in the disturbance and Officer Wertz arrived on scene to assist Officer T. Helman. The male and female were subsequently arrested and charged with Disorderly Conduct and Fail to Obey Lawful Order.

04/19/19: Officer Rowe was dispatched to the 7-11 Convenience Store on Salem Avenue for a report of an armed robbery. An employee advised a male entered the business through the front door and pulled a handgun from his waistband. He demanded money from the cash drawer. She handed him the money from one of the cash registers and he demanded her to open the second cash drawer. She replied that it was empty so he fled out the front door carrying the money and four packs of cigarettes. The suspect is described as a white male wearing a blue zip hoodie with his hands covered by the sleeves, blue jeans, white sneakers, and a gray under shirt. This case has been forwarded to the Criminal Investigative Unit for further investigation.

04/20/19: Officer M. Hill responded to North Mulberry Street for a burglary. The victim stated a male suspect, wearing only blue underwear, was found in his residence. He yelled to the male who then fled out the back door. The police were able to locate the male in the alleyway between Fairgrounds Avenue and Wayside Avenue. The officer questioned the male as to why he was in this residence. The male stated he lives on North Mulberry and he thought it was his residence. Due to the suspect being inebriated, he was transported to Mertius Medical Center for an Emergency Evaluation. The suspect was charged with Burglary 4th Degree and Trespass Private Property.

04/21/19: Officer St. Clair was dispatched to West Irvin Avenue in reference to a malicious destruction of property. The victim stated to the officer that sometime during the night, someone had damaged the driver side mirror to her 2015 Nissan Armada. The mirror assembly was bent outward as if something hit it. The mirror assembly and glass will need to be replaced. A witness advised that she saw a white four-door hatchback stop in the roadway with no lights on at about 10 p.m. She observed a white male leave the vehicle and then she heard glass shatter. The witness yelled at the male which caused him to get back in the vehicle and leave the area. The officer will attempt to see if the incident was captured on a surveillance camera in the area.

04/23/19: Officer Patterson was flagged down by a male while on patrol on Manor Drive. The male showed the officer an approximate 2 inch wide laceration to his right wrist and advised that he had been assaulted by his ex. The male stated he and the suspect had been living together in an apartment at the Bradford Apartment Complex. He advised the suspect that he wanted her to move from the residence. The suspect came back to the apartment to retrieve some of her personal belongings when an argument ensued. According to the victim, the suspect picked up a four inch, brown-handled knife and stabbed him. The suspect denied stabbing the victim. It should be noted the officer could smell the odor of alcohol coming from the suspect's breath. The suspect was transported to Central Booking and charged with Assault 1st and 2nd Degree and Reckless Endangerment.

CHART NO. 2 – A&E PARKING DECK WEEKLY OCCUPANCY





CHART NO. 3 – UD PARKING DECK WEEKLY OCCUPANCY


