DEPARTMENT OF COMMUNITY & ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

1. **Main Street:**

PARKS & ENGINEERING DEPARTMENT

ENGINEERING DIVISION

1. **Construction Updates Related to School Opening.**
- Northern Avenue: It will likely take Columbia Gas' contractor, Kinsley Construction, until the end of September to finish installing the new gas main and service lines. Following completion of the installation, it will probably be an additional three weeks while their restoration contractor, Henson & Son, patches all of the utility trenches. The contractor will wait until 7:30 a.m. to begin work which should avoid the heaviest bus traffic. They will always have at least one lane of traffic in each direction open. We asked the Board of Ed to send a traffic advisory to the parents of students of the two schools in this area letting them know they should allot additional time to get in and out of the schools.
 - South Potomac Street (area of BISFA, Maryland Theatre, and the Schmankerl Stube): South Potomac Street will be closed 6 AM – 6 PM on 8/29/19 and 8/30/19 for work planned at BISFA; there will also be a westbound lane closure on Antietam Street at the Stube on 8/30/19. All of the contractors are aware that beginning September 3rd they will not be allowed to do any lane closures before 9:30 AM. Unfortunately, there will probably be a couple of days next week when work at BISFA will still have Potomac Street closed until 5 PM or so. Parent parking signs on West Washington Street were reinstalled this week and staff is working to make sure that the area behind BISFA is open to accept bus traffic. There will be a couple of single-day closures of South Potomac Street for BISFA construction through the Fall however staff is hoping that that they will end by mid-November.
 - Delaware Lane and Key Avenue: Columbia Gas is working to get as much done as possible before September 3rd. Delaware Lane will be open to traffic at all times; they will likely be working for a couple weeks on Key Avenue, but that will mainly be replacing sidewalks on the West side of the street (away from the school).
 - Haven Road Sidewalks: Staff had hoped to complete the bulk of this work over the Summer. Unfortunately due to delays by State Highway on approving our funding match, the City has not been able to start. Work is now anticipated to begin in early October.

- Indiana Avenue: Columbia Gas plans to start installing a new gas main in this street on 8/30/19. For the most part, the new main will be under the West/North sidewalk; pedestrians will be directed over to use the East/South sidewalks. Columbia Gas is aware of the bus schedules for Western Heights and Salem Elementary School and will attempt to keep traffic flowing during the peak times. Indiana Avenue is a fairly narrow street, so the contractor they may use flagmen to assist in directing traffic around the work areas.
 - Marsh Run Concrete Wall Repairs: The South wall repairs went very well and the cost was less than expected. The contractor is now working on the North wall and thankfully lanes along the North wall will not need to be closed to traffic.
2. **Annual Pavement Preservation Program.** Our paving contractor, Craig Paving, will start milling and paving the streets on our attached list next week. This work will continue off and on into November. While Craig Paving typically does a good job of keeping at least one lane of traffic open, some congestion and delays are inevitable and expected. Staff will try to send out weekly traffic advisories to let the public know what specific area delays may occur.
 3. **Professional Court Bridge.** The County advertised the bridge contract for bids this week. Bids are due October 4th.

REPORTS

08/22/19: Officer Brady responded to the area of Walgreen's Pharmacy on the Dual Highway for a personal injury accident. Fire and medical personnel were already on scene for the four vehicle accident. A witness told the police she observed a pick-up truck moving in an erratic manner. The driver was weaving in and out of traffic and struck a Nissan Pathfinder, which caused a domino effect with two additional vehicles. The driver of the pick-up truck attempted to flee the scene. When the officer was removing the driver from the truck he could smell a strong odor of alcohol. The driver's speech was also slurred and he had difficulty maintaining his balance. The officer conducted a check on the driver and discovered his license had been suspended through Maryland and his vehicle was uninsured. The driver was unable to provide a breath sample due to his level of intoxication so he was transported to Meritus Medical Center for a blood specimen. The driver was then charged with Driving While Impaired by Alcohol, Driving an Uninsured Vehicle and other related charges.

08/23/19: Officer Brady was dispatched to Save A Lot grocery store on Maryland Avenue for a trespassing complaint. When the officer arrived on scene he saw the male in question seated on a bench directly in front of the business. The manager stated the business submitted a Letter of No Trespass to HPD against the male. The officer was able to verify the letter on file at HPD was still active. The officer arrested the male and charged him with Trespassing Private Property. It should be noted the male had a copy of the No Trespass Letter in his pocket.

08/24/19: Officer K. Hill responded to Central Avenue for a burglary report. The caller advised his Rally M80 Mountain Bicycle was missing from inside his residence. The incident occurred sometime between August 22 at 8 a.m. and August 23 at approximately 5 p.m. The bike was the only item missing from the residence. The victim advised the officer that he had recently noticed items around his house to be moved such as the patio furniture had been moved and a door mat had been flipped over. There are no suspects at this time.

08/25/19: Officer K. Hill was on her beat at approximately 7 a.m. when she saw a very young, black male run into the street. She stopped and made contact with the male but he did not respond to her questions. He made noises but appeared to be non-verbal. The young male had only a urine-filled diaper on and was shivering due to the chilly morning temperatures. The child was transported to HPD and Child Protective Services were called for assistance. The officers fed him, changed his diaper and wrapped him in a blanket. The social worker arrived and stated she was familiar with the child. The social worker advised that the child was four years old, is non-verbal and is autistic. The child, who lives with his grandmother, had left the home before. The social worker had a safety plan in place for the family, but apparently the plan had not worked. The grandmother was then notified of his whereabouts. Ultimately more than an hour lapsed before the grandmother arrived to pick him up. She was then charged with Neglect of a Minor.

08/26/19: Officer Vogel was dispatched to the Green Turtle on Shank Farm Way for a report of prostitution. The caller, a 14 year old male, stated he was with a group of his friends at McDonald's on Northern Avenue. He had entered the men's restroom when he was approached by an older male offering him money in exchange for sex. The victim reported the incident to the manager and then called 911. The officer searched the area and found the suspect inside the Green Turtle. The officer approached the suspect and asked him to identify himself but he refused. The officer asked the male to exit the restaurant so they could talk in private. The male refused and became increasingly loud which caused a scene in the restaurant. The male was then placed in investigative custody and escorted outside. He was then identified by his Maryland license. The male refused to answer any questions so he was placed in the cruiser where he continued to yell and kick the cruiser door. He was then transported to Central Booking and charged with Disorderly Conduct. The investigation is continuing.

08/27/19: Officer Main responded to Hertz Rent-A-Car on South Colonial Drive for a reported vehicle theft. A Hertz employee advised the officer that a female, who provided a South Carolina driver's license, rented a red 2018 Nissan Maxima bearing a Texas registration. Hertz discovered that on July 16, 2019 the credit card used by this female was not her account. Hertz attempted to reach her but discovered the phone number and name provided by the female was false. The vehicle in question has not been returned. Officer Main placed the vehicle into NCIC as stolen. The estimated value of the vehicle is approximately \$18,000. No other information is available at this time.
