PARKS & ENGINEERING DEPARTMENT

ENGINEERING DIVISION

1. **United Way Day of Caring.** The Parks & Engineering Department sponsored a Storm Drain Stenciling Project for United Way volunteers on September 19th. Approximately 35 volunteers divided themselves into groups and dispersed to 6 different sectors of the City, using City-supplied stencils, paint, and materials to mark "Only Rain in the Drain" messages and graphics on

storm drainage inlets and catch basins. This project helps the City to fulfill the “public involvement” and “public education” requirements of our Stormwater permit. Special thanks go to the volunteers from Middletown Valley Bank, the Community Action Council, and the Antietam-Conococheague Watershed Alliance for their hard work!



2. **Pavement Preservation Program.** Work crews from Craig Paving, Inc. continued with the annual pavement milling and overlay work. By the end of this week, they will have milled the pavement on Potomac Avenue from Northern Avenue to the CSX railroad crossing; they plan to overlay that section next week. They will then continue to mill and overlay North Potomac Street from Oak Hill Avenue to Franklin Street.
3. **ADA Curb Ramp Improvements.** The City's contractor has nearly completed the list of handicap curb ramp replacements that were part of this year's contract; this work is part of the City's long term transition policy to bring all public sidewalks into compliance with ADA regulations.

1. **City Park Fall Fest – September 21, 2019.** Celebrate the fusion of arts, entertainment, history, and music this Saturday at Hagerstown City Park for a day of family fun from 10 a.m. – 4 p.m. The event kicks off with a free children's Monarch Butterfly Parade from the Hagerstown Cultural Trail to the Park. Free activities include pony rides and petting zoo, barrel carts and Tommy 202 rides, living history, paddle boats on the lake, arts and crafts activities, Museum tours, a rock climbing wall, an inflatable bounce-house, and more (see attached map)!

In partnership with community organizations, from 12-3 p.m. Bester Community of Hope presents the South Side Community Block Party with 40 free community resource vendors and attractions including live entertainment at the band shell. Music from the porches of historic homes on Prospect Street can be heard during the 5th Annual PorchFest celebration. This event is held 2-6 p.m. Enjoy a variety of musical performances, food and arts vendors, and even a kid's porch with special entertainment for children. REPORTS

09/12/19: Officer Thompson was dispatched to Frederick Street for the report of a theft. The caller stated that she was on a smoke walk and walked by her place of employment. She decided to pull on the door to make sure it had been secured for the night. When she pulled the door it opened and she noticed the alarm had not been set. She walked inside the store and immediately noticed the cash register was gone. The caller stated a coworker was to secure the business for the night but apparently had forgotten to do so. The caller stated she would call the owner of the business. There were no cameras inside or outside of the business. There are no suspects at this time.

09/13/19: Officer Molineaux responded to South Locust Street for a reported toddler home alone. When the officer arrived at the residence, a young child answered the door. The toddler stated his mom was at work. The officer observed the residence was in deplorable filth and there was an odor of rot and decay coming from within the home. The fridge had only moldy and rotten food. Upon further investigation, the other rooms in the house were in the same condition. The officer found a teenage male in one of the upstairs bedrooms. He advised he was told by his mother to stay home from school to watch his brother. While waiting for the mother to arrive home, a female arrived at the residence to state she was supposed to watch the toddler on this day but no one had brought him to her. She was just checking in to see what happened. There seemed to be confusion as to whom was to watch the young male. Child Protective Services arrived and stated the CPS is familiar with this family. A safety plan was set in place and code enforcement was notified of the condition of the home. This report was forwarded to the Department of Social Services.

09/14/19: Officer Brady and other officers were dispatched to the parking lot behind North Mulberry Street for a reported assault in progress. The victim stated that a friend of his contacted him and suggested they meet up in the North Mulberry parking lot. The victim agreed to the meeting place. When the victim parked his car the friend got in the front passenger seat. Just minutes later four unidentified males approached the car, opened the door, displayed a knife and demanded that the victim empty his pockets. The victim managed to flee the area. The suspects did not obtain any of the victim's property. The friend was uncooperative in giving any information regarding the incident. It is believed that the friend set up the victim to be robbed. There were no witnesses and no cameras in the area. No additional information is available at this time.

09/15/19: Officer Rowe responded to Georgia Avenue for a report of items being stolen from a shed. The homeowner advised he noticed the lock to his shed was missing. When he went to investigate he discovered that a wagon and pressure washer were missing. The wagon was valued at \$50 and the pressure washer was valued at \$400. There were no cameras in the area and there are no suspects at this time.

09/16/19: Officer Rowe was dispatched to District Court on West Antietam Street for a report of a male refusing to leave the property after causing a disturbance in the Court House. Upon police arrival the male in question was seated on a curb just outside District Court. He claimed he had an altercation with a court bailiff and the bailiff physically removed him from the Court House. The male requested the bailiff be charged with assault. The officer advised the male that the court bailiff has the authority to remove anyone that is causing a disturbance in the Court House. The officer advised the male to stop yelling and leave the property. The male did not comply and he was placed under arrest and charged with Disorderly Conduct and Fail to Obey.

09/18/19: Officer Keefer responded to South Cannon Avenue for a parking complaint. A maroon Ford Fusion was reported to be abandoned on the street with a piece cardboard in place of a tag. The officer conducted a MVA record check on the handwritten tag number. The check revealed that the vehicle was not registered. The vehicle was towed by Blue Gray Towing and a hold was placed on the vehicle for valid registration.

CHART NO. 2 – A&E PARKING DECK WEEKLY OCCUPANCY





CHART NO. 3 – UD PARKING DECK WEEKLY OCCUPANCY



AFTER HOUR CALL BACKS

- Wednesday, 9/11/19 @ 4:45 p.m.: A truck struck the main electrical feed to the traffic signals at Maryland Avenue and Memorial Boulevard knocking the signals out of operation. City Light responded immediately to restore power overhead. However, the wire had been pulled out of the meter socket. Signal staff was called in to rebuild the interior of the meter socket for full power restoration. The signals were placed back into operation by 6 p.m.

SNOW OPERATIONS. The weather is still warm but preparations have begun for the upcoming snow season. Washington County Government places a combined bid for road salt that includes the City of Hagerstown. The bid has been received and staff will be bringing the bid to the Mayor and Council for approval in October.

An independent contractor, Hart's Landscaping and Snow Removal, will be contracted once more to assist with snow operations. Their areas will include Hager's Crossing and Collegiate Acres on the west side of the city and Londontowne and Greenwich Park on the east side along with a number of other streets in those areas. The City is geographically large enough to warrant the help with snow operations in lieu of purchasing more trucks and using more drivers.

Staff has also been at work preparing the trucks and snow equipment (plows, salt spreaders, etc) for the winter. Two new trucks used for snow plowing are currently being built and should be ready for operations by the end of November.


