ENGINEERING DIVISION

1. **Eagle Scout.** Logan Hine made a presentation to our office with a summary of tree inventory for his Eagle Scout project. He will give his presentation to City Council on November 19th. Street tree planting is beginning this week, and our main goal will be to add trees to empty tree pits as identified by Logan. We expect to plant approximately 80 trees plus the 30 that ACWA is planting with our contractor digging the holes.

2. **Pavement Marking.** The pavement marking company has not been responsive to our requests the last 5-6 weeks. Many of the recently overlaid streets remain unmarked. Colder weather may prevent them from completing the pavement markings although we will continue to push them.

3. **Completed this Week.** The City Park Lake outfall pipe replacement and the East Memorial bridge deck replacement were both completed this week.

PARKS DIVISION

1. **Fit Room Report.** See attached schedule of classes happening in the Fit Room in the month of November.
2. **Recreation Programs.** Staff is preparing for a Star Party this Saturday, November 2 from 6:30-8:30 p.m. in the soft ball field at City Park (meeting/parking near the Train Hub). In partnership with the Tri-State Astronomers, the group will share their passion with a guided tour of the night sky. 20 participants have registered for the program.
3. **Wheaton Park.** Improvements are about 90% complete. City staff did an excellent job installing the bleachers and new backboards. Court coating will be completed in the next few days and artwork will be done in the Spring.



4. **City Park.**
 - Staff began construction on five docks that will hold the new Christmas lighting display.
 - Staff are constructing a concrete pad for the new ADA bleachers at the softball fields.

PLANNING & CODE ADMINISTRATION

Planning Commission: The Planning Commission considered these matters on October 30, 2019:

- Public Review Meeting – 2018 Comprehensive Plan – Amendments to Future Land Use Map and Designation. Seven persons provided testimony on the proposed amendments. A majority of the speakers had concerns about the change to the Doub Farm area of the plan.
- Consultation – Parking Lot Reconfiguration at City Park - agreed to allow this site plan follow the “minor site plan” review process, however, the staff will bring it to the Planning Commission for review since it is over 5,000 square feet of disturbed area.
- 2019 Land Management Code Amendments – Final Review. Commission members agreed to send the proposed package of amendments to public review meeting in November. A special meeting is being considered for November 19 at 7 p.m.

Historic District Commission: The HDC held a special meeting on Wednesday, October 30th to consider cases that were on the October 24th agenda which had to be canceled due to lack of a quorum:

- 114 East North Avenue – Timothy Perrott – approved a fence.
- 208 South Prospect Street – Paul and Alece Drnec – approved a rear addition.
- 98 West Washington Street – The Yarn Shop/Michele Nolan – approved window and door signs.
- 1019 Oak Hill Avenue – Robert and Edith Miller – approved a fence.

Board of Zoning Appeals: The BZA will consider a variance application filed by Franklin R Turner for property located at 216 North Cannon Avenue. The variance is for a reduction in the side setback to allow construction of a fire escape. The hearing will be held on October 24.

REPORTS

10/24/19: Officer White responded to Walmart on Garland Groh Boulevard for a report of shoplifting. Dispatch advised the officer that the suspect left Walmart and was heading in the direction of Home Depot. The suspect pulled over and parked her vehicle in a parking space. The officer gathered information from both the driver and passenger. Dispatched advised the driver did not have a valid driver's license and the registration on the vehicle had expired. She was given several citations and her vehicle was towed from the property. The passenger had an active warrant with the Washington County Sheriff's Office. The warrant was verified as active and she was arrested. The passenger was also identified as the shoplifter. No further details are available.

10/25/19: Officer Lucas was dispatched to East Washington Street for a report of a male stumbling in the road. The caller was delivering newspapers and the male wanted to fight him. The caller did not know the male. The officer approached the male who had glassy eyes, slurred speech and his movements were exaggerated. The officer determined the male was under the influence of alcohol and dispatched an ambulance to the scene. There was a witness at the scene that stated this same male kicked in his air conditioner and broke his window. Photos of the broken window were submitted to records at the Hagerstown Police Department. The male refused medical help and was subsequently charged with Disorderly Conduct, Disturbing the Peace and Malicious Destruction of Property.

10/26/19: Officer Moczydlowsky responded to Security Road for a reported armed robbery. The victim was an employee of a local cab company. The victim had just picked up his fare at Washington Gardens and was ready to leave when a vehicle blocked his path. A dark-skinned black male approached the cabbie with a handgun and asked for all his money. The suspect took the cabbie's money and his car keys and fled the area. The passenger in the back seat was unharmed. No further details are available at this time.

10/27/19: Officer Miscannon was dispatched to Little Elliot Drive for a report of a stolen vehicle. The victim stated that she parked her 2012 black Volkswagen at approximately 9 p.m. on October 26. When she went to her vehicle at 9 a.m. on October 27 the vehicle was gone. She remembered when she parked her vehicle the night before she had a bag of groceries in her hand and perhaps she laid the keys on the seat. She and a friend searched the neighborhood but did not locate the vehicle. Her vehicle was placed into NCIC as stolen. Later, the vehicle was located in a wooded area on Eastern Boulevard. The vehicle was locked and appeared to have a red and white paint transfer on the front bumper. The vehicle was removed from NCIC as stolen. There are no suspects at this time.

10/28/19: Officer Oates, School Resource Officer, was contacted by the assistant principal of Western Heights Middle School that an assault had just occurred. The victim was in the school nurse's office to receive care for the puncture wound on his chest. The officer gathered information regarding the incident and learned that two students were in a verbal argument that turned physical. One student grabbed his pencil and assaulted the victim in the chest. The aggressor was charged with Assault 2nd Degree and his father arrived at school to speak with the officer. No further details are available.

OTHER NEWS/INFORMATION

Congratulations to Sergeant Scott Leeney and Officer Jon Molineaux. Officer Jon Molineaux and Sergeant Scott Leeney have been chosen as Officers of the Month for September 2019. Officer Molineaux has been employed by the City of Hagerstown for 12 years and Sergeant Leeney has been employed for 13 years. Both are currently assigned to the Patrol Division.

In September 2019, Officer Molineaux and other officers from HPD responded to a report of a disturbance involving knives inside a residence. Officer Molineaux, who was the first to arrive, located a distraught female wielding two knives. Officer Molineaux immediately attempted to de-escalate the situation and to get the female to put down the knives. The female hid while Officer Molineaux continued to attempt to talk her into dropping the knives. At one point the female reappeared and threw one of the knives in Officer Molineaux's direction. Officer Molineaux maintained his composure and continued to attempt to get the female to drop the remaining knife. Other officers eventually arrived on scene, including Sergeant Leeney who took over efforts to engage the female in dialogue. Sergeant Leeney began to build rapport with the female, and after talking with her for some time, eventually persuaded her to drop the remaining knife and to surrender peacefully to get the help that she needed. Due to the efforts of Officer Molineaux and Sergeant Leeney, the situation was resolved without injury to any of the parties involved.

Based on their calm demeanor and patience in successfully resolving a volatile situation, Officer Jon Molineaux and Sergeant Scott Leeney have been selected as the Hagerstown Police Department Officers of the Month for September 2019. The Hagerstown Police Department is proud to have dedicated officers such as Officer Molineaux and Sergeant Leeney as some of its own and congratulate them for a job well done.

CHART NO. 2 – A&E PARKING DECK WEEKLY OCCUPANCY





CHART NO. 3 – UD PARKING DECK WEEKLY OCCUPANCY
