PARKS & ENGINEERING DEPARTMENT

ENGINEERING DIVISION

1. **Professional Boulevard Bridge.** On Wednesday, the County received eight bids for the Phase I (*bridge only*) Extension of Professional Court. The low bid was from Kinsley Construction at \$8.9 million. The budget was \$9.2 million. Construction will start in later Winter. The road improvements on each approach to the bridge (including the widening of our existing Professional Court) will be bid in 2021. The MOU with the County will be on an upcoming Work Session agenda, hopefully in November, as we are working out the final details of it now.
2. **Haven Road & Pennsylvania Avenue Sidewalk Project.** We held a pre-construction meeting with the contractor and State department's staff to review the various requirements and scheduling. The contractor will start work on Haven Road the week of November 18th between Pennsylvania Avenue and Glenwood Avenue, contingent upon his completion of several required items. Work on Pennsylvania Avenue will not start until the Spring due to delivery time of signal equipment. We will coordinate accordingly with schools, churches, businesses, and residents.
3. **Street Trees.** We are identifying and marking locations of new street trees this Fall for our contractor and for the ACWA volunteers. The 28 ACWA trees are expected to be planted by Sunday. Botanica will be planting approximately 60 additional trees on other streets.
4. **Pavement Markings.** Our Pavement marking contractor has been avoiding us the last 5-6 weeks (evidently busy with larger customers) but they say they will stripe our recently paved streets and parking lots. If not, we may have another contractor do some of the main center and lane lines to carry us through Winter.

5. **Railroad Closure.** CSX will be doing repairs to the Eastern Boulevard crossing North of Jefferson Street soon, and the Northbound detour will be through Jefferson, Cleveland, Franklin and Locust Streets; the Southbound detour will be Potomac and Washington.

REPORTS

10/31/19: Officer Campbell made contact with a victim in regards to a theft from a motor vehicle that occurred on East Avenue. The victim advised she parked her vehicle on East Avenue the previous evening at approximately 9:30 p.m. When she entered her vehicle the next morning she noticed that items were missing from her vehicle. She stated she locked her vehicle but later discovered one door did not latch completely. The officer reviewed the City camera in the area of the theft and viewed the suspect enter the vehicle from the passenger side. The suspect is seen carrying items from the scene. A photo of the suspect has been sent to police personnel in an attempt to identify the suspect. No further details are available at this time.

11/01/19: Officer Kimmel responded to Madison Avenue for a reported disturbance. The caller advised his neighbor threatened him with a firearm. The caller stated he and his neighbor got into a verbal altercation regarding the caller being accused of placing leaves in front of the neighbor's residence. The neighbor then went into his residence and came out with a firearm. The caller felt unsafe and called the police. The police did locate a rifle in the neighbor's residence, but it was unloaded. The firearm was confiscated, transported to HPD and packaged the rifle and placed it into evidence. The neighbor was arrested and charged with Assault 1st and 2nd Degree, Reckless Endangerment and Firearm Use/Felony Violent Crime. No further details are available.

11/02/19: Officer Brady was dispatched to North Potomac Street for a reported malicious destruction to property. The victim stated that his neighbor alerted him that his tires appeared to be slashed. Upon investigation it was discovered that both rear tires to his black GMC Yukon had been slashed. The cut mark was approximately 2" long and had a smooth surface. Replacement cost is estimated at \$1,200. The victim also owns a Ford Explorer that had a tire on the driver's side that had been damaged as well. The victim valued this tire to be \$300. The Ford Explorer was parked in front of the Yukon. No further details are available.

11/04/19: Officer Fuqua responded to Police Headquarters for a report of an attempted kidnapping. The victim stated she was walking to work and while she was on South Prospect Street two males jumped from the bushes. One male wrapped his arms around her neck and the other male covered her mouth while dragging her into the bushes. She fought back and was able to remove the hand from her mouth and began screaming for help. The two males fled the area. It should be noted the assault took place on October 31 but was not reported to the police until November 4. The victim stated she could not afford to lose a day of work and decided to wait until her day off from work to report the assault. No further details are available.

11/06/19: Officer Lucas was dispatched to East Avenue for the report of a burglary. The victim stated that someone had broken a rear entry door window pane and forced entry into his apartment. The victim advised that he recently evicted a male from a rented room in the apartment due to drug usage. The victim believes the suspect was the former renter as the only item missing was a television that actually belonged to the evicted male. The victim estimated the cost to repair the door would be \$200. No further information is available at this time.

CHART NO. 2 – A&E PARKING DECK WEEKLY OCCUPANCY





CHART NO. 3 – UD PARKING DECK WEEKLY OCCUPANCY


