Basement Fire – Vermont Avenue: On Tuesday, May 19, 2020, firefighters responded to 412 Vermont Avenue for a report of a smell of natural gas. Upon arrival firefighters discovered a fire in the basement of the home. The residents were able to safely evacuate thanks to the working smoke alarms in the home. Firefighters quickly extinguished the fire but were on the scene for several hours. One pet perished in the fire. Due to smoke damage the residents were not able to stay in the home and were assisted by the American Red Cross.

PARKS & ENGINEERING DEPARTMENT

ENGINEERING DIVISION

1. **Hagers Crossing.** The connection to McDade Road was completed this week. For the last 20 years, the developers have wrangled with the County on what would be required for improvements on Broadfording Road to allow a connection to McDade Road. The County conceded significantly over the decades and several County staff to get to this point.



2. **Out to Bid.** This week we advertised the contract for new security systems in the parking decks. Next week we hope to advertise Pangborn Park Lake Reconstruction and Handicap Accessible Ramp installation.

PARKS DIVISION

1. **COVID.** Several conversations were held this week with user groups about reopening including Summer Camps, Ice Rink, Pony League, BMX, softball and Little Leagues. Attached is a chart of when recreation and cultural facilities may open under the Governor's phased plan.
2. **City Park.** We continue to plant along the upper lake to stop erosion. Staff is installing underground electric to replace overhead lines to the rear of the Band Shell.

PLANNING & CODE ADMINISTRATION

Board of Zoning Appeals: The BZA considered two cases on May 20, 2020:

- 1700 Abbey Lane - Margaret Myers – denied a variance request to reduce the required rear setback for a roof over a deck.
- 607 West Washington Street – Jake Baer/Olde Towne Development LLC – deliberations on this case were postponed from the April 22 hearing in order to obtain guidance from the City Attorney. With the guidance received, the Board agreed to approve the special exception with conditions for a brew pub. The parking variance application was dismissed.

Planning Commission: The Planning Commission will consider these matters on May 27, 2020:

- Medium Range Growth Area – discussion of proposed boundary adjustment.
- AW Orndorff Plumbing & Heating – 716 Security Road – site plan for demolition and parking lot improvements.

Historic District Commission: The HDC acted on three cases on May 14, 2020:

- 823 Oak Hill Avenue – Pete Loewenheim – approved a roof replacement project.
- 822 Forest Drive – P. Sean Guy and Alice J. Guy – approved a rear privacy fence.
- 14-16 East Antietam Street – Bowman Development – demolition of building (case was withdrawn by the applicant prior to the meeting).
- 17 East Avenue – Mark Bartel – approved a projecting sign.

REPORTS

05/14/20: Officer T. Kelley was on duty at the Watch Center and received a call from a local business reporting a stolen company vehicle. The manager of the business stated that their business vehicles are equipped with a GPS to track their vehicles. The vehicle was deemed missing on May 12th and last tracked in Kearneysville, West Virginia. The company made numerous attempts to reach the driver of the vehicle but was not successful. Since the vehicle had been missing for two days they decided to report it stolen. As a result of declaring the vehicle stolen, HPD was contacted by the West Virginia State Police to notify the stolen vehicle was impounded in Charles Town, West Virginia. The driver had been arrested with traffic related charges. The vehicle was removed from NCIC as stolen. The company that owns the vehicle will not be pursuing charges against the driver. No further details are available.

05/15/20: Officer T. Helman responded to the County Wash Tub on West Washington Street for a reported trespasser. The female attendant advised a black male, who had been refusing to leave the property, had passed out and was slouched over in a chair. The officer attempted to awaken the male and the male opened his eyes but would not respond. The officer continued to question the male to identify him but the male would not cooperate. It should be noted the male could speak and understand but just refused to answer any questions. Once at Central Booking the male still refused to talk, however officers we able to identify him through other means. He was charged with trespassing private property.

05/16/20: Officer Mazloum was dispatched to Byers Stop N Go on Burhans Bouelvard for a warrant attempt. Officers M. Hill, Rowe and Routzahn arrived to assist if needed. Officer Mazloum told the male he was under arrest for a valid warrant and to place his hands behind his back. The male started to flee the store but the assisting officers were able to apprehend him. When apprehended, the male became combative and assaulted three of the police officers. It was necessary to spray the male with pepper spray to gain control of the situation and avoid others from being hurt. The male caused damage to the store's property and inventory. Byers Stop N Go will be filing charges against the male for the damage done to the property. The male was transported to Central Booking to be processed for the active warrant. No further details are available.

05/17/20: Officer Kimmel responded to Walmart on Garland Groh Boulevard for a disturbance. Before the officer arrived, the callers advised the parties involved in the incident had left the scene. The callers stated they were in line at the Dunkin Donuts inside the Walmart when they saw someone they had a bad business encounter with. The callers confronted the male and his friend stating they were displeased with the tattoo he gave them. The verbal disagreement quickly turned physical when the male struck one of the callers on the right side of her face. The male and his friend left the scene. Through HPD's database the male was identified. The male and his friend were later apprehended and charged for the incident.

05/18/20: Officer Deavers was assigned to the Watch Center and received a call from a caller who wanted to report her credit card had been stolen from her vehicle. The caller further stated that she had been contacted by her bank that someone had used her card at Sheetz. The caller was not certain if she secured her vehicle for the night. When she checked her vehicle, the credit card was indeed missing from the console. This case was forwarded to the Criminal Investigation Unit.

OTHER NEWS/INFORMATION



Congratulations to Officer Travis Crouse: Officer Travis Crouse has been selected as Officer of the Month for April 2020. Officer Crouse has been employed by the City of Hagerstown for 14 years and is currently assigned to the Patrol Division.

In April 2020, Officer Crouse assisted the Hagerstown Police Department Criminal Investigation Division and the United States Marshals Service in attempting to apprehend an armed robbery suspect. The subject was wanted for questioning in a local robbery and had multiple out-of-state felony warrants for drug and firearm related charges. The subject was also wanted through New York for a violation of probation with an underlying charge of murder. Information was developed that the suspect was occupying a vehicle traveling in the Hagerstown area. Officer Crouse observed a vehicle matching the description of the one that the suspect was supposedly traveling in and began to follow it. The vehicle began to drive erratically in an apparent attempt to evade Officer Crouse. As this

was occurring, Officer Crouse observed a passenger throw suspected drugs out of the vehicle window before exiting the vehicle and attempting to flee on foot. Officer Crouse was able to pursue the suspect on foot and eventually caught him and took him into custody without any further incident. The suspect originally provided a false name, but was eventually identified as the suspect that the U. S. Marshals were attempting to apprehend.

Based on his attention to detail and his keen instincts, Officer Crouse was able to apprehend a dangerous, wanted felon who had been on the run for almost three years. Based on his decisive action, Officer Crouse has been selected as the Hagerstown Police Department Officer of the Month for April 2020. The Hagerstown Police Department is proud to have dedicated officers such as Officer Travis Crouse as one of its own and congratulates him for a job well done.

MRPA / MACPRA / MML Recommendations for Recreation & Parks Facilities, Programs and Activities

The Maryland Recreation & Parks Association (MRPA), Maryland Association of County Park & Recreation Administrators (MACPRA) and the Maryland Municipal League (MML) Parks & Recreation Association is pleased to present general recommendations for a phased re-opening of recreation and park facilities as part of Governor Hogan's "Maryland Strong: Roadmap to Recovery" plan. The recommendations listed below were developed in consideration of survey data collected from National and Statewide Recreation & Parks professionals. In providing the suggested framework, the agencies recognize the following realities:

1. Information and conditions related to COVID-19 are subject to change; therefore, this a working document which is also subject to change;
2. Recommendations listed may be altered as gathering-size restrictions are adjusted from stage-to-stage or within a given stage;
3. Since conditions vary within the State & region, local jurisdictions should work closely with their designated health officers to develop detailed plans appropriate to their given situation; Interpretation across jurisdictions may vary based on a variety of factors.
4. Many facility and activity types can be modified in order to meet safe conditions as determined by State/local officials. Individual plans for modification of facilities and/or activity types should be vetted with local health officials and may impact the stage in which facilities and activities are re-opened in a given jurisdiction.
