
DEPARTMENT OF COMMUNITY & ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Business Development: DCED team members attended the 2021 Business Summit hosted by the Chamber of Commerce at Hagerstown Community College. The Summit was a useful networking event with seminars surrounding managing Human Resources/Leadership, Marketing, and Finances for small businesses. The team was able to make new business connections and will follow up for potential development opportunities.

Main Street:

Holiday Cheer Grant: Grants for up to \$300 (\$900 for property owners with multiple tenants) are available for businesses and non-profit organizations in the Main Street District. Funds can be used for decorations (lights, ornaments, garland, trees, etc.), scheduled music services, and installations. The goal of the grant program is the beautification of Downtown Hagerstown, increasing foot traffic in the district, and encouraging economic activity during the winter holiday season. Deadline to submit applications is November 24. Please note: this is a first come, first served program; awards will be made on a rolling basis until funds are expended. ENGINEERING

1. **Cultural Trail.** The southern half of the project between the alley and Antietam Street is taking shape. The lights and fencing will be added in the near future.



2. **Wesel Boulevard.** C Wm Hetzer completed the final surface paving on Wesel Boulevard, including the extra paving on Halfway Boulevard for the County. If the weather cooperates, the final pavement markings will start going down the middle of November. Final signage will also be installed over the course of the next week or so. Guiderail installation is also scheduled in mid-November. There is still a section of bike path that needs to be paved, and some trees need to be planted in the medians, but the project is nearing substantial completion.
3. **Heyser Wine Cellar.** The wine cellar reconstruction began this week and will repair the failing front wall.



4. **Electronics Recycling Event.** The Electronics Recycling event will be held this Saturday at the Municipal Stadium from 10 a.m. – 2 p.m.

REPORTS

10/28/21: Officer StClair responded to the warehouse for The Hope Rescue Mission on North Prospect Street in reference to a burglary. The officer made contact with the caller and he advised the warehouse stores clothes that are shipped to other countries. On this day a bar was discovered on the fence surrounding the warehouse. The bar was used to bend the fence and create an opening which was large enough for a person to crawl through. There was clothing scattered over the floor but unable warehouse staff was unable to verify if any clothing was taken since the items are not inventoried. There was no camera that captured the incident.

10/29/21: Officer M. Anderson received a call at the Watch Center from a citizen who wanted to report that some unknown person threw a brick through her front window. The incident happened around midnight and there were no witnesses and no security cameras that captured the incident. The window damage was estimated to be \$500. No further details are available.

10/30/21: Officer Wheat was patrolling the area of Berkson Avenue and Wellers Alley due some recent crime in that area. The officer observed a mini-van parked in a private parking area. Officer Wheat approached the van on foot and did not see a driver but did see several passengers. As the officer spoke with the passengers, he could smell a strong odor of marijuana coming from the van. The officer asked the passengers to exit van and started the probable cause search of the van. Sergeant Lucas and other officers arrived on scene to assist with the search. The search turned up a large number of baggies that contained a green vegetable matter inside, containers of what appeared to be cocaine, and a handgun that was hidden under the dash. All subjects were placed under arrest and transported to the Washington County Detention Center. All suspected drugs will be sent to the Western Maryland Crime Lab for testing and measurements, and a test fire has been ordered for the handgun. The subjects were charged with numerous drug charges and handgun violations. No further details are available.

11/01/21: Officer McDermott responded to the area of Randolph Avenue for a report of shots fired. The victim stated that he had been seated in a vehicle when an unknown person robbed him at gunpoint. The victim advised there were other passengers in the vehicle as well. The victim tried to run but the suspect fired a shot at him at he fell down. The suspect took the victim's cell phone and cash from his pocket and fled the area. Officer Cramer located a spent shell casing and the victim's phone. As the officer continued to gather information regarding the incident, the victim began changing the details about the robbery. It should be noted the officer discovered an outstanding warrant for the arrest of the victim. The victim was transported to the Washington County Detention Center. No further details are available.

OTHER NEWS/INFORMATION

Congratulations to Detective Tony Fleegal. Detective Anthony Fleegal has been selected as Officer of the Month for September 2021. Detective Fleegal has been employed by the City of Hagerstown for 20 years and is assigned to the Criminal Investigations Unit.

Detective Fleegal serves as the one of the Department's liaisons with the Washington County Child Advocacy Center and is tasked with investigating the majority of the serious child abuse and juvenile sexual assault cases referred to the Police Department as well as other types of serious crimes and incidents as needed.



Recently, Detective Fleegal was instrumental in investigating and obtaining an indictment of a local teacher and coach who had an inappropriate relationship with a student from more than 10 years prior. The teacher had left the area, but was eventually located and charged. In another case, Detective Fleegal recently obtained charges for a father who had been molesting his child for over 10 years. In that case, Detective Fleegal put in long hours and was able to obtain the charges and have the suspect in custody within a week of the allegations coming to light. Detective Fleegal also authored numerous search warrants to further his investigation of the incident.

These cases are just two recent examples of Detective Fleegal's investigative activities. Based on his dedication and perseverance in investigating these crimes and for his efforts in attempting to obtain justice for victims of some of the most heinous crimes, Detective Fleegal has been selected as the Hagerstown Police Department Officer of

the Month for September 2021. The Hagerstown Police Department is proud to have dedicated officers such as Detective Fleegal as one of its own and congratulates him for a job well done.

CHART NO. 2 – A&E PARKING DECK WEEKLY OCCUPANCY





CHART NO. 3 – UD PARKING DECK WEEKLY OCCUPANCY



All documents will be transported directly from the event to the paper shredding facility in a secured truck. The documents will then be shredded, baled, and sent to a paper recycling facility where the ink is removed, the paper is turned into a pulp, and ultimately used to create new paper or fiber products.

NEW ▶ Secure paper shredding. **ALL DOCUMENTS** will be **PROPERLY DESTROYED** and then recycled!



ACCEPTABLE ITEMS: Computers—CPUs, monitors, peripherals, printers, keyboards, photocopiers, fax machines, VCRs, televisions, stereos, cell phones, home & office phones, and consumer electronics.
