2. **Events**

- Cabin Fever Blues Bash was held on March 6, 2014 at 7:00 PM at the Maryland Theatre. Approximately 750 attended the event. Sponsors and attendees had a great time. Now we are looking forward to May 29 to June 1, 2014.
- The Western Maryland Blues Fest's new website went live this week. It is responsive to all mobile devices. Tickets are now on sale for the festival through the CVB. A flyer on the event which will be held from May 29 to June 1, 2014 is attached.
- The St. Patty's Day Run for Your Luck Event is this Saturday, March 15th. The event is a combined effort of the City of Hagerstown, Washington County Recreation Department and the Community Free Clinic. Over 450 are registered already.
- The Maryland International Film Festival Committee met this week. They are gearing up for May 1 through May 3, 2014. Opening night is at the Maryland Theatre, then films will be shown at the Bridge of Life and the Academy Theatre. Also, an event at the Discovery Station is planned for May 3, and then free animated films will be shown at the Bridge of Life for May 3, 2014 from 10:30 AM to 11:30 AM.
- Staff are working with a group on the upcoming Taste of the Arts Event on April 24, 2014. The event will benefit the Maryland Theatre, the Washington County Arts Council and the Barbara Ingram School for the Arts.

9. **Upcoming Projects:** Staff is working with CBG Communications to draft an RFP for a complete upgrade to the broadcast equipment in Council Chamber. The bid is expected to be awarded in April, and equipment installation will occur in the spring.

PLANNING & CODE ADMINISTRATION DIVISION

1. **New Businesses**

- **Historic District Commission:** The HDC conducted a workshop for a proposed façade rehabilitation/reconstruction at the Bridge of Life Building on the left (north) side of their main sanctuary.
- **Maryland Department of Planning Meeting:** Staff attended the quarterly meeting for Planning Directors in Crownsville on March 11th. The only notable legislative item mentioned was reauthorization of the Sustainable Community Tax Credits. Some type of credit is proposed for inclusion that would benefit small businesses. It was also noted that the Governor has requested that the Smart Growth Commission undertake a study on infill development – best practices and incentive opportunities. Most of the agenda was devoted to hearing about conservation easements. An urban counterpoint to rural conservation easement programs was the work of NeighborSpace of Baltimore County, a non-profit, that acquires vacant lots and other left-over remnant lands to create pocket parks in the older suburban ring neighborhoods around the City of Baltimore.

- **Tourism Impact:** At its annual meeting last week, the Washington County Museum of Fine Arts reported on the impact of the "Valley of the Shadow" exhibit that ran from June, 2012 to July 2013. The director reported that the exhibit was by far the most extensive and successful in the history of the institution. Statistics include: lenders: 53, artifacts: over 400, grant funding received: over \$80,000, visitors: over 46,000 from 45 states and 25 foreign countries, attendees at lectures and programs associated with the exhibit: 5,318. Part of the City's adopted strategy to observe the 150th anniversary was to encourage local institutions to create programs of their own and take "ownership" of the observance. Staff recommended this program and model to the museum and their staff picked it up and ran with the concept, resulting in major success for the museum, and an influx of tourism and visitation to the City for almost no investment by the city.


