 - Staff coordinated an Earth Week Celebration at University Plaza this week. Program participants were Pieter Bickford, Councilmember Penny Nigh, Councilmember Lewis Metzner, Rodney Tissue, and Waste Management's Erika Deyarmin. Student remarks were made by Kamryn Grosh and Aiyana Joyce and music was provided by Savannah Brown, all from Barbara Ingram School for the Arts. Special guests were thirty-four students from Pangborn Elementary School who participated in recycling activities. Immediately following the program, a ribbon cutting was held at the Barbara Ingram School for the Arts for the Earth Day Visual Art Exhibition Ribbon Cutting. Barbara Ingram visual arts students were exhibiting 2 and 3 dimensional environmentally themed art. In effort to celebrate our planet, the works related to environmental concerns, education, and conservation. The exhibition will be in the gallery of the Barbara Ingram School until April 29th.

- The Arbor Day Ceremony was held on Friday, April 25 at Fairgrounds Parks. Bester School Students and St. Mary students were our special guests and planted trees. Remarks were made by North Hagerstown High School students. Councilmember Martin Brubaker will be officiating. Pieter Bickford was the Master of Ceremonies.
 - The Taste of the Arts Event was held on April 24, 2014 from 5:00 PM to 8:00 PM. The event benefits the Maryland Theatre, the Washington County Arts Council and the Barbara Ingram School for the Arts. Individuals were able to delight all of their senses with the sights and sounds of local artists while sampling culinary treats at 13 venues. 235 tickets were sold to the event.
 - The Maryland Film Festival is coming up from May 1 to May 3, 2014. Opening night which is May 1 will start with a VIP Reception at the Washington County Arts Council at 5:00 PM and then a red carpet event at 6:00 PM. The feature film will be Coffee, Kill Boss. Celebrities in attendance will be Director Nathan Marshall and Eddie Jemison from Ocean's Eleven and Thirteen. The after-party will be at Bulls & Bears on Thursday, May 1 at 9:00 PM. Tickets are \$12. More information on the rest of the fest will be forthcoming. Tickets are on sale at www.marylandiff.com.
 - On May 3, 2014, United Way will be doing a Born Learning Event at University Plaza and the Youth United Event on South Potomac Street called HubBub. It will be from 10:00 AM to 3:00 PM. They will have children's activities. South Potomac Street will be closed for the event, and this was approved with all the street closures in February.
 - Maymart will be occurring in Public Square on May 8, 2014 from 8:00 AM to 2:00 PM. We are then hosting Market in the Square once a month starting in June.
 - Staff are working on all aspects for the Western Maryland Blues Fest. The event will be May 29, 30 and 31 and June 1, 2014. The winners of the Children's T-shirt Artwork contest were picked this week. We had 61 submissions.

INSPECTIONS KEY:	
Categories of Conditions	
Safety	Conditions which are or reasonably present a hazard to occupant or public. Example: No smoke alarms, improper wiring, handrails
Neighborhood Vitality	Conditions which cause or tend to cause diminution to property Example: Weeds, trash, debris, junk vehicles, deterioration of a structure.
Quality of Life	Conditions which negatively impact occupants. Example: Damaged surfaces, damages elements, missing screens
Preventive Maintenance	Conditions which are technical violations and need addressed to prevent deterioration. Example: Mortar deterioration, clogged gutters, minor rotting wood

PARKS & ENGINEERING

1. **Broadfording Road Reconstruction** A pre-construction meeting for the Broadfording Road Improvement project was held on Wednesday. Barring any unexpected delays, the contractor plans to begin clearing and grubbing operations on May 5th. Two-way traffic will be maintained through the construction zone until later in the summer, at which point the road will be completely closed to traffic for a 2-3 week period. Construction is expected to be substantially complete by the end of August.
2. **Another Grant Secured** Working with staff at the local Soil Conservation District (SCD), we secured a \$208,667 grant for the rock vane/boat launch at Kiwanis Park. SCD will shoot to bid this with construction in the fall. We hope to officially open the park by the end of the calendar year.
3. **43-53 West Washington Street** The contractor discovered previously unknown asbestos behind the metal siding (interior and exterior walls) and the proposal shows the removal of this asbestos will add significant costs to the project. The total expected cost of asbestos removal for both buildings is now \$100,000-120,000.
4. **Dog Park Parking Lot** The parking lot is now open for use, complete with two handicap parking spaces.
5. **Arbor Day** This year's Arbor Day ceremony is being held on April 25th, at 10 a.m. in the Hagerstown Dog Park located in Fairgrounds Park. Six redbud and two hawthorn trees will be planted by students from Bester Elementary School and St. Mary's Catholic School.
6. **Pavement Markings** Our contractor painted 18 parking spaces on Chase Street and 8 spaces on Ridge Avenue. This was done to assist the Burhans Station restaurant. In addition, the contractor installed bike lane markings and pavement markings at the recently completed Frederick Street Culvert.
7. **Smoking Enforcement** The police auxiliary continue to enforce "no-smoking". This past weekend, they were in City Park, Fairgrounds Park, and Pangborn Park, and some of the smaller facilities such as Hager Park and the ball diamonds. They made contact with almost 20 citizens to enforce the smoking ban. We will have a no-smoking education presence at the Blues Fest events and at other events around Memorial Day.
8. **Recreation** Attached are two flyers on upcoming events. We are distributing 20,000 flyers (Hager House, Railroad Heritage Days, City Park events) to all the elementary schools.

2. **REPORTS**

- **04/17/14:** Officer Lippy responded to George Street in reference to a malicious destruction of property. The victim reported that his black Volkswagen mini-van had been damaged by spray paint all over the driver's side window. He also added there is a history of issues dealing with juveniles vandalizing vehicles in the area. No further information is available at this time.
- **04/19/14:** Officer Koontz was dispatched to Woodpoint Avenue for a report of shots fired. Upon the inspection of the front yard, two spent shell casings were located. The victim advised that all doors were secured so apparently the suspect picked the lock. The officer did observe scratches around the key hole on the driver's side. The missing items included a Garmin GPS, Pioneer CD player and miscellaneous CD's. There are no suspects at this time.

3. **PRESS RELEASES**

- **04/21/14:** The Hagerstown Police responded to Locust Point and contacted the Department of Social Services in reference to a missing juvenile. Officers learned that Monica Stevens was in Hagerstown on April 21st with family and then went missing. Stevens currently lives in Baltimore and through investigation, officers learned that she ran away to avoid returning to her residence in Baltimore. The Hagerstown Police Department is asking anyone with information on this juvenile's whereabouts to call 301-790-3700.

4. **OTHER NEWS/INFORMATION**

- **Congratulations:** Officer Marty Weedon has been selected as the Officer of the Month for March 2014. Officer Weedon has been employed by the City of Hagerstown for over one year and is currently assigned to the Patrol Division. Officer Weedon was selected, not so much for what he does on duty, but for what he does off duty in an attempt to make a difference in the lives of children in the community. It is not uncommon for Officer Weedon to take less fortunate children whom he comes into contact with at work out to events with his family while he is off duty to give them a sense of inclusion. He sometimes even uses personal time to take off from work to attend events with some of these children. Officer Weedon has also been known to stop in at recreation centers while he is working to volunteer to help children with their homework. According to the supervisor who nominated Officer Weedon, "... everyone knows he is an officer of HPD (Hagerstown Police Department), which sheds positive light on the department and shows that our officers are willing to make the community a better place..." As a result of his community involvement and genuine caring for the youth of the City of Hagerstown, Officer Weedon was selected as the Hagerstown Police Department Officer of the Month for March 2014. The Hagerstown Police Department is proud to have dedicated officers such as Officer Weedon as one of its own and congratulates him for a job well done.

- **Welcome Aboard:**
 - Officer Joseph Delicati joined the Hagerstown Police Department as a Police Officer on Monday, April 21, 2014. He was officially sworn in on April 22nd and was assigned to the Uniformed Patrol Delta Platoon.
