3. **City Farmers Market** Approximately 50 people attended the public input session on August 8 at 25 West Church Street to discuss Catalyst Project #7 which targets expansion of the hours and operations of the City Farmers Market as a means of filling a gap in the specialty food stores retail market and providing groceries and locally grown produce for downtown residents and restaurants. Also, the group reviewed the highlights of a Request for Proposal to have the management of the market become privatized. The Community City Center Plan calls for the City to review the current operational model and consider placing the market under private management.

1. **Zoning Certificates Issued:**

- 222 Frederick Street – Remarkable Property Services, LLC – office only for a property maintenance and preservation company; and an office only for a graphic design business.

2. **Planning Commission:** The Planning Commission considered the following cases on August 12, including:

- Paradise Hospitality Group – 431 Dual Highway – approved the site plan for a new entrance to Route 40.
- 28-50 East Baltimore Street – Washington County Board of County Commissioners – approved the final plat.
- Land Management Code Amendments – Update on Mayor and City Council Review.
- New Land Management Code Amendment: "Indoor Plant and Cultivation and Processing Facility, Brewery, and Distillery" to definitions and list of permitted uses. Public review meeting will be held on August 26.
- CortPark Concept Plan Review –approved the sketch plan subject to seven conditions.

3. **Highlight Hagerstown Awards:** The Hagerstown Beautification Advisory Committee met on August 6 to review nominations and choose winners for this year's award. The Highlight Hagerstown Awards Program recognizes properties that enhance the curb appeal of the city through landscaping, façade, and other exterior improvements. PARKS & ENGINEERING

1. **CSX Trail Crossings** – Staff met with the engineering consultant for CSX Transportation to discuss the Arts & Entertainment Trail and the potential Marsh Run Trail; the purpose of the meeting was to identify CSX requirements for construction where these trails will cross the existing railroad line. Staff will work to incorporate these requirements into the designs for both projects.

2. **Program Open Space** - Approved on the County level, we submitted applications for the two projects listed below to the Maryland Department of Natural Resources to request POS funding for FY 2016. (We were also approved \$45,000 on the County level for the A&E Walking Trail; however, since we do not yet own the land, we delayed requesting approval from the State until we receive the deed.)
 - \$36,000 Fairgrounds Park Soccer Field Lighting
 - \$27,000 Fairgrounds Park Pavilion

3. **Community Parks & Playgrounds** – We also submitted applications to the Maryland Department of Natural Resources to request CP&P funding for FY 2017. (Notice of award will not be received until April or May 2016.)
 - \$35,000 City Park – Replacement Play Equipment for South End
 - \$35,000 Park Benches, Picnic Tables & Trash Cans – various parks
 - \$10,000 Potterfield Pool Climbing Wall
 - \$10,000 Potterfield Pool Spray Amenities (add to existing splash pad)
 - \$30,000 Golf Cart Storage/Pavilion

4. **Community Yard Sale** – Out of 72 stalls, only 45 were rented for the August 8 yard sale. Our next yard sale is scheduled for Saturday, October 10. Since this is the same date as the Harvest Hoedown, we expect that all of the stalls will be rented. If you are interested in renting a stall, please call the Parks & Recreation office at 301-739-8577, ext. 169.

5. **Kiwanis Park** – Partially funded by Program Open Space, concrete was poured for the wooden boardwalk; construction of the first of two boardwalks is now complete.

- 6. **Grounds Maintenance** - Our crews continue to trim trees and clean up debris, trim shrubs and weed, and turf maintenance.
- 7. **Recreation Programs:**
 - *Fall Adult Sports Leagues* – Registration is open now for our Fall Leagues! We have added a NEW program – Ultimate Frisbee, in addition to bringing back Kickball and Dodgeball. A flyer is attached.
 - *Intro to Yoga* – A free class was held at Robinwood Professional Center on Wednesday, August 12 in partnership with Meritus. 25 students attended.
 - *Beginner's Yoga* – This six week series begins August 22 and registration is open now through Active Network.
 - *Yoga for Weight Loss* – This is the third time we are holding this class due to popularity. It begins August 22 and will continue for 8 weeks. Registration is open now.
 - *Other New Programs* – Staff is working on finalize other new fall programs including: Geocaching in the Parks, Fitness Boot Camps, Parkour, Zumba and more!
 - *New Parks and Recreation Brochure* – Staff is working with Icon Graphics on a new Fall/Winter Guide highlighting our new programs, facilities and parks. It is scheduled to be printed by September 10.

- 9. **Safe Routes to school at Bester Elementary:** Most of the 8-foot path has been completed and construction of handicap ramps and pedestrian lights at the intersection of Frederick Street and Memorial Boulevard is underway. We worked with the Board of Education to develop an alternate walk route for students on Frederick Street.
- 10. **Green Street at Park Circle:** Project is not moving as fast as we had expected. We are pushing the contractor to furnish more workers on this project.
- 11. **Demolition of 40-50 East Baltimore Street:** We opened bids for the contract to demolish these two buildings with low bid of \$39,400. We will review bids with Mayor & Council when the City takes ownership of the property from Washington County.

2. REPORTS

- 08/05/15: Officer Craft was on duty at the Washington County Free Library when a man approached her to report his bicycle had been stolen. The victim stated he parked his bicycle on the bike rack behind the library. The bike is described as a men's Xcaliber blue and yellow mountain bike. The library security camera showed a white male with glasses, wearing a red American Eagle shirt, black pants and white sneakers remove the bike from the bike rack and take it from the area. The officer was able to identify the suspect from the camera footage and charges are forthcoming.
- 08/07/15: Officer R. Dean responded to the area of Fairground Park for a robbery. The victim advised that he was seated on a bench when three black males asked him for a cigarette. When he opened the pack of cigarettes, a fourth black male approached from his right and punched him in the side of his face. One of the males grabbed his cell phone and they took off running west on Fairground Avenue. One male was wearing a white tee shirt and red shorts. The immediate area was checked but no one could be found that matched the description. No further information.
- 08/08/15: Officer Culp was dispatched to West Franklin Street for a burglary report. The victim advised that someone had entered his residence and stole his iPad. The victim stated that a black male, who sleeps in his car just down the street may be a suspect. He would have the advantage of viewing the victim's comings and goings. The black male could not be located. No further information is available at this time.
- 08/09/15: Officer Lam responded to Guilford Avenue in reference to an assault report. The victim stated he was approached by a male wearing a green shirt demanding his bicycle. When the victim refused to give him his bicycle the suspect threw an unopened can of beer at him and struck him in the head. The suspect was identified and the officer went to his residence. He admitted to being involved in an altercation but then became extremely uncooperative and argumentative. The officer will be filing charges of Assault 2nd Degree on the suspect.

3. PRESS RELEASES

- On 08/08/15 officers from the Hagerstown City Police Department responded to the corner of Concord Street and East Place for a report of a vehicle into a garage. Officers located a Mazda vehicle with one occupant, the driver 28 year-old Patrick Lawrence Mechler II, with life threatening injuries. Mechler was transported to Meritus Medical Center where he was later pronounced dead.

It was determined through investigation that Mechler was traveling west on Concord Street. He failed to stop for a stop sign, crashed into a light support pole and then into a garage. The garage sustained structural damage and the roads were closed for several hours while the re-construction team conducted an investigation for the crash. No further information is available at this time.

4. OTHER NEWS/INFORMATION

- Congratulations to Officer Michael Ault: Officer Ault has recently become a member of the Special Response Team (SRT) of Washington County. He has been employed by the City of Hagerstown since August of 2013 and is assigned to the Patrol Division of the Hagerstown Police Department.

The Washington County SRT is a specially trained and equipped unit of officers from the Hagerstown Police Department and deputies from the Washington County Sheriff's Department. It is designed to respond to and resolve situations requiring skills, training, and equipment not typically available to the average police officer.

This team is trained to handle situations such as hostages/stand-offs, snipers, execution of high risk drug search and seizure warrants, apprehension of known violent criminals, and to provide protection to V.I.P.'s.

Membership in the WCSRT is strictly voluntary. Officers and Deputies wishing to be considered for membership must first fulfill specific qualifications prior to consideration. These officers constantly undergo intense practical firearms training, tactical exercises,

and classroom education. Within the Unit, individual officers specialize in counter sniper tactics, chemical munitions, and stun munitions. The effectiveness of the WCSRT is based upon the members' ability to work together utilizing methods of operation learned and practiced as a team.

The Hagerstown Police Department is proud to have Officer Ault join this specialized training team. Thank you to all the officers and deputies that have volunteered and qualified to serve on this team.

Water Production at R C Willson

- The Phase IV work continues - staff has received written approval from Maryland Department of the Environment to begin the secondary disinfection conversion from free chlorine to chloramine. The conversion will occur the week of August 17th. Production and Distribution crews continue to work throughout the system in preparation of the conversion to Chloramines.
- *Operations*
 - Crews primarily worked on routine facilities maintenance and routine preventive maintenance. Training is ongoing in preparation of the Chloramination conversion.
- *Maintenance*
 - Maintenance staff worked on routine preventive maintenance. Staff continues to prepare for the Chloramination conversion.
- *Instrumentation*
 - Instrumentation staff continues work with ABB on the new SCADA system. Staff also continues work in the Distribution system and Pump Stations.
