INSPECTIONS KEY:

Categories of Conditions

Safety	Conditions which are or reasonably present a hazard to occupant or public. <u>Example:</u> No smoke alarms, improper wiring, handrails
Neighborhood Vitality	Conditions which cause or tend to cause diminution to property <u>Example:</u> Weeds, trash, debris, junk vehicles, deterioration of a structure.
Quality of Life	Conditions which negatively impact occupants. <u>Example:</u> Damaged surfaces, damages elements, missing screens
Preventive Maintenance	Conditions which are technical violations and need addressed to prevent deterioration. <u>Example:</u> Mortar deterioration, clogged gutters, minor rotting wood
Planning & Zoning	Conditions which violate Land Management Code requirements (zoning, forest conservation, floodplain, historic district and other requirements) and progress inspections of development projects for site plan compliance. <u>Examples:</u> Uses not permitted in property's zone, construction of new facilities, follow up inspections on open violations.

FIRE DEPARTMENT

- Hagerstown Fire Department personnel from A-shift visited residences in the 600-700 block of South Potomac Street, the 600-700 block of Spruce Street, the 500-700 block of Maryland Avenue following a kitchen fire at 721 South Potomac Street on the evening of September 13, 2015. Personnel met with the citizens in this area to promote fire safety, visiting a total of 152 homes. Of the homes visited, HFD was able to test alarms in 75 homes. All homes visited that resulted in contacts confirmed working smoke alarms with the following exception: two smoke alarms installed and two batteries replaced.

Of the homes visited, we were met by concerned citizens that welcomed us into their homes. They commended the crews on their attention to public safety and were impressed by our level of concern.

2. Units from the 2nd Battalion B-shift turned out at about 3:20 a.m. on September 17, 2015 for a fire in an occupied, three story brick walk-up. As units arrived, HPD on-duty officers were working on two floors to evacuate the building's occupants. Thankfully, a total of eight citizens were safely removed. Our command officer immediately requested the "safety dispatch" bringing all on-duty HFD resources.

As the first attack line went in service on the 2nd floor, personnel were confronted with a very high heat producing post-flashover fire in two rooms and the hallway to the apartment facing the street. This was difficult work given the configuration of the building and the well developed fire that was extending to the third floor and the exposure apartments. This is an unsprinklered building with no confirmation of working smoke detectors upon arrival...a dangerous combination for citizens and sworn personnel.

We thank HPD officers and HFD personnel who did an excellent job in avoiding a more tragic outcome.

PARKS & ENGINEERING

1. **Kiwanis Park.** The new walkways have been partially blacktopped around the new pavilion and boat ramp. We are now grading and preparing to construct the parking lot. Working with the Monarch Alliance, we are preparing an area for a Way Station Garden for the Monarch Butterfly. The dedication ceremony for the park is October 3rd.
2. **Request for State Funds.** Community Parks and Playgrounds funding was approved and appropriated for the two projects listed below by the State General Assembly, however, Board of Public Works approval is necessary prior to the commitment of funds. Both projects will be submitted to the Board for approval in the very near future and, if approved, we may begin the projects.
 - Community Garden - \$30,000: Expand the Community Garden and add permanent fencing. The Community Garden is used by individuals and groups to produce their own food.
 - Staley Park Pavilion - \$25,000: Construct a 20' x 30' pavilion to accommodate seating for large groups of visitors at the park.
3. **Golf Course.** Staff is preparing for the 3rd Annual Par Fore Pink tournament to be held on Friday, October 2nd in partnership with Meritus Health's Make a Difference Breast Cancer Screening Program. Sixteen golfers have registered to date. A flyer is attached and registration is available on our website at www.hagerstowngreens.com

2. **REPORTS**

- 9/17/15: Office Walck responded to HPD for a reported theft of a cell phone. The victim stated that he was walking on West Side Avenue when a black male in a vehicle stopped and asked to use his phone for an emergency call. The victim complied and the black male took the phone and sped away in his vehicle. The victim did not know the suspect, however he did notice the suspect was wearing a CITI Bank identification card. The phone was entered in NCIC as stolen. It should be noted that later in the same day Officer Vanderwall responded to North Cannon Avenue for the same type of theft call; a black male asking to use the cell phone for an emergency call then speeding off with the cell phone. No further information is available at this time.
- 9/19/15: Sgt. Zimmerer, Officer Koontz and Officer Rutkowski responded to Taylor Avenue for a report of shots fired. The caller was able to describe the shooter as a black male, black pants and a black hoodie with the hood over his head. When HPD arrived on scene they observed a black male, concealed between two parked vehicles, which matched the description of the suspect given by Dispatch. The officers announced their presence and gave the verbal command to the suspect to show both hands in the air. The suspect complied and he was transported to Central Booking without incident and charged with Handgun on Person, Reckless Endangerment and Discharging Firearm within City Limits.
- 09/20/15: Officer St .Clair was dispatched to the intersection of Jonathan Street and Church Street in reference to a robbery in progress. The victim advised he was riding his bicycle and he approached three black males and asked where the closest liquor store was located. The suspect advised HPD that he is new to the area. The victim then began to pedal off and was struck in the head with an object which knocked him off his bicycle. The suspects took his wallet and fled the area. There were no witnesses. No further information is available at this time.

3. **OTHER NEWS/INFORMATION**

- **Congratulations to Officer Heather Aleshire:** Officer Aleshire has been assigned as the Hagerstown Police Department's Public Information Officer. She has been employed by the City of Hagerstown for 15 years and is currently a School Resource Officer and Juvenile Coordinator. Some of her new responsibilities will be as follows:

- Department internal and external communication strategies.
- Coordination and management of the day-to-day operations and dissemination of information to the public through the news media.
- Responding to all major incidents, and assisting the Commander by providing accurate and timely information to the media.

We wish her well as she assumes these additional responsibilities.

- **Welcome to Jeffrey Morgan:** Jeff Morgan joined HPD on September 21, 2015 as the part-time Accreditation Manager. Mr. Morgan retired as a Police Sergeant from the Hagerstown Police Department however after his retirement he remained active in the law enforcement field. He further expanded his education and earned a position on the staff of several Police Academies. Jeff has now come full circle and is back to HPD.

Accreditation is a "Stamp of Approval" showing the Department complies with a set of nationally accepted standards formulated by the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies (CALEA) as essential to the professionalism of police agencies and its employees.

Departments desiring to be accredited do so on a strictly volunteer basis. Voluntary participation assures that departments are committed to attaining and maintaining the highest standards of professionalism. The Hagerstown Police Department's initial accreditation was gained in March of 1994.

Mr. Morgan will be consistently reviewing HPD's organization, management, operations and administration to assure the agency will comply with the three year reaccreditation standards. Compliance translates to excellence for the Department.

Engineering Staff worked on the following projects:

- Multiple permit reviews, underground locates, and service upgrade requests have been reviewed and/or completed by Engineering staff.
- The Substation Technician and Distribution staff placed animal guards on various parts of HLD substation equipment to lessen the chance of widespread outages due to varmint and bird caused outages. Over the past 8-10 years, animals causing outages in HLD substations have been drastically reduced by the installation of these devices.
- The Staff Engineer met with various developers within the City in regards to projects in vacant buildings.
- The Substation Technician coordinated and participated in the testing of HLD power transformers at Zayre Substation with Harford Electrical Testing of Joppa, MD. Each of HLD's substation power transformers are on a rotating testing schedule to ensure proper operation and reliability.

Administration

- Staff continues to work on issues related to the two Energy Storage Projects with ALEVO and Mitsubishi Heavy Industries.
- Staff met with the MELP ownership to discuss the going forward process required to complete the project.

Water Production at R C Willson

- Staff conducted a project close-out progress meeting to begin the process for substantial and final completion per MDE funding requirements. Staff had a conference call with the contractor responsible for the SCADA system to finalize a completion schedule and discuss on-going conversion issues. Final punch lists have been developed for the General Contractor and a project completion schedule has been developed for the SCADA provider. It is anticipated that substantial completion will occur on September 30th with final completion being October 30th.
- Operations
 - Operations were route with all staff assisting with the SCADA cut-over process for the filters. Routine preventative maintenance and facilities maintenance work was also completed.
- Maintenance
 - Maintenance staff worked on routine preventive maintenance and continues to provide assistance with plant operations, as needed.
- Instrumentation
 - Instrumentation staff continues work with ABB on the new SCADA system.

Water Production at Breichner

- The Edgemont Reservoir pool elevation is -6.9 feet below crest and the bypass valve and the hydrant are closed to allow for natural fluctuation of the pool elevation and seepage evaluation. Staff continues to work with Triad Engineering regarding the ongoing Study and seepage evaluation. Triad and staff are working on edits to the Study to include cost estimates and a prioritized sequence for future work – the final report is expected on Friday. Site evaluation is on-going to track and document seepage associated with recent precipitation and natural fluctuation of the reservoir.

Water Distribution

- Distribution crews are working throughout the system performing customer service as needed. Crews continue to work on Buford Drive finishing the service changeovers. Crews also repaired leaks on Lauran Road and Mill Street.

Laboratory

- Laboratory work was routine for the week. Staff continues to work with the Operations staff on the Chloramination conversion. System sampling is ongoing and will continue on a weekly basis.


