

DEPARTMENT OF COMMUNITY & ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

- Main Street Update:** DCED hosted a leadership team meeting of the co-chairs of each of the five Main Street Work Groups, and the City staff liaisons that are providing subject expertise to each group on Thursday, March 3. DCED arranged for Amy Seitz and Susan Sheppard of the Maryland Department of Housing & Community Development and the State Main Street Program to attend and present as part of the meeting. The meeting was an opportunity to refresh on the mission of the City's Main Street program, review past accomplishments and outline future goals.

2. **CRIZ Testimony:** Councilmember Brubaker, DCED Director Jill Frick, Rob Ferree of Bowman Development and Rich Daughtridge of High Rock Studios traveled to Annapolis on Wednesday, March 2 to testify at the Senate hearing in support of a Community Revitalization Improvement Zone (CRIZ), enabling legislation for a new economic development financing tool.

PARKS & ENGINEERING

ENGINEERING DIVISION

1. **Cultural Trail: Getting the Word Out.** Rodney Tissue presented the trail project to the Longmeadow Rotary on Monday night. The group was very enthusiastic to the project. In addition, Rodney was invited by the Maryland Arts Council to speak about the project on April 1st to the Regional Public Art Administrators group that meets in Baltimore and is facilitated by Americans for the Arts. As part of that day, staff will view the Baltimore Light Festival. Temporary art displays like this along the Trail as part of a festival annually or biannually is something we are beginning to discuss.
2. **State Highway.** City staff attended the quarterly meeting with staff from the SHA District office and the County engineers. Some highlights of the discussion include:
 - Northbound I-81 will be paved this spring
 - The widening of the I-81 Potomac River bridge and related Interstate widening will be bid in April.
 - SHA will be installing over 100 ADA-compliant ramps on Route 40 in Hagerstown this fall
 - Designing ADA and APS improvements for Dual Highway at Cleveland and also Dual Highway at Tracy's Lane

- The signal loops destroyed on Dual Highway during paving are NOT replaced yet and this is making for poor traffic flow
 - Signal timing at Route 60 was resolved
 - No progress on the Bike Route 11 or Scenic By-ways signs
 - SHA will re-do the crosswalk pavement markings in the Square in the next month
 - Pavement markings on the paving project downtown will be completed in the next month.
3. **Walnut Street at Antietam Street.** Issued the Notice of Award to Valentine Electric. Due to delivery time for poles, we expect this work to be completed in April/May.

2. REPORTS

- **02/25/16:** Officer White responded to Broadway for a burglary in progress. The officer spoke to the maintenance manager for the building and he advised that someone had kicked in the door to an apartment in the complex. Officers White and St. Clair announced themselves as they entered the apartment. At that time, five subjects ran out the opposite door. The officers were able to apprehend two of the five individuals. Those individuals advised they had permission to be in the apartment but Ridge Craft Properties advised that no one other than the lease holder should be the apartment at this time. Two arrests were made. No additional information is available at this time.
- **02/26/16:** Officer Wolfe was dispatched to the corner of West Washington Street and South Prospect Street for the report of a robbery. The victim stated she just left 7 Star Convenience Store and withdrew some US currency. She advised that a black male came up behind her and struck her in the back of the head and took her money. - **Congratulations to Officer Brad Helman - Officer of the Month.** Officer Brad Helman has been selected as Officer of the Month for January 2016. Officer Helman has been employed by the City of Hagerstown for 25 years and is currently assigned to the joint Hagerstown/Washington County Warrant Task Force.

Since being assigned to the Warrant Task Force in 2014, Officer Helman has demonstrated himself to be one of the most active officers in serving warrants and summonses. Through his dedication and commitment over the past 2 years he has served in excess of 800 arrest warrants and 500 criminal summonses plus numerous other court processes. His supervisor at the Warrant Task Force described him as an "excellent" police officer and "an asset to the Warrant Task Force."

Based on his hard work, dedication, and enthusiasm for the job, Officer Brad Helman has been selected as the Hagerstown Police Department Officer of the Month for January 2016. The Hagerstown Police Department is proud to have dedicated officers such as Officer Helman as one of its own and congratulates him for a job well done.

Water Production at R C Willson

- Staff is working with MDE on the new funding package for the replacement of the Traveling Screens at the R.C. Willson Plant and for the installation of active mixing system in four (4) finished water storage tanks.
- Operations
 - Operations were routine this week - staff worked on facility maintenance and routine preventative maintenance.
- Maintenance
 - Maintenance staff worked on routine preventive maintenance and continues to provide assistance with plant operations, as needed.
- Instrumentation
 - Work is ongoing for the lighting and heating system in the Chlorine rooms. The Hellane tank was taken off line for the annual tightness test. Staff continues to work on miscellaneous upgrades to Pump Station 2 on Northern Avenue.

Water Production at Breichner/Edgemont Reservoir

- The Edgemont Reservoir is currently -0.8 feet below full pool elevation. The by-pass valve and the hydrant are open. The 24" sluice gate is also open per guidance provided by MDE and Engineering staff. Site evaluation is on-going to track and document seepage. Staff submitted a revised funding package to MDE for repairs to the Edgemont Reservoir. Staff continues to work with MDE to refine the day to day operations of the Reservoir.

Water Distribution

- Distribution crews are working throughout the system performing customer service work as needed. Crews continue to exchange residential meters. Meter testing is ongoing and staff has completed the annual fire-line readings. Field crews repaired an 8" leak on Mt. Aetna Road and are planning on repairing the 10" water line under the railroad tracks on Oak Ridge Drive on March 6, 2016 – work is being coordinated with Norfolk Southern.

Laboratory

- Collected source water samples from Edgemont Reservoir and Potomac River for LT2 monitoring.
- Submitted proficiency testing results for laboratory recertification.
- Responded to customers concerns regarding water quality.
- Collected weekly TOC on Potomac River.
- Collected weekly THM/TOC samples on the Willson Plant.
- Process and regulatory testing was routine for the week.



