Protective Treatment Code

All exterior surfaces, including but not limited to doors, door and window frames, cornices, porches, trim, decorative features, balconies, decks and fences shall be maintained in good condition. Exterior wood surfaces, other than decay resistance wood, shall be protected from the elements and decay by painting or other protective covering or treatment. Peeling, flaking, chipped paint shall be eliminated and surfaces repainted. All siding and masonry joints as well as those between the building's envelope and the perimeter of windows, doors, and skylights shall be maintained in good repair, weather resistant and watertight. All metal surfaces subject to rust or corrosion shall be coated to inhibit such rust and corrosion and all surfaces with rust and corrosion shall be stabilized and coated to inhibit future rust and corrosion.

Applies to any surfaces painted including:

- Structures
- Garages
- Accessory Structures
- Storage Sheds
- Fences
- Retaining Walls

Taking a structure back to original brick

A structure can be taken back to its original brick. However, there are methods not approved by the City of Hagerstown and others that will require additional safety measures to be in place. There may also be requirements for lead paint abatement as defined by the State of Maryland Department of the Environment.

Do you own rental properties constructed prior to 1978?

All residential rental properties constructed prior to 1978 must comply with Maryland's Lead Risk Reduction in Housing Act. The law requires rental property owners to:

1. Register all their rental dwelling units every year with the Maryland Department of the Environment (MDE). There is a cost for this registration.
2. Have lead paint inspections prior to changes in tenancy; and
3. Distribute specific lead risk education materials.

Why register with MDE?

- Protect your tenants and yourself from health risks.
- The use of lead paint was prohibited in 1978.
- Without certification and by not following approved practices, property owners can face fines and potential lawsuits.
